Minutes of a Regular Board Meeting March 10, 2010

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) was held Wednesday, March 10, 2010 at 5:00 p.m., at the District Administration Office at 1960 La Costa Ave., Carlsbad, California.

1. Call to Order

President Juliussen called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

2. Roll Call

Upon a motion duly made by Director Sullivan seconded by Director Kulchin, and carried, the Board of Directors approved the agenda.

6. Presentations and Awards

A. Achievement of an Individual Award.

President Juliussen stated that Ian Riffel recently received his Grade II Collection System Maintenance Certification from the California Water Environment Association. President Juliussen presented background information about Ian and congratulated him for his efforts. President Juliussen presented Ian with an incentive check for \$500 as prescribed under LWD's Incentive Program.

The Board of Directors also congratulated lan for his accomplishment. Ian thanked the Board for their encouragement and the motivation that the Board provides at the Board meeting.

B. Achievement of an Organizational Objective.

GM Bushee reported that LWD staff achieved an organizational objective under LWD's Incentive Program. On February 19, 2010, LWD staff completed seven years without a lost time injury accident. GM Bushee noted that the Field Services staff spends considerable time in the field performing manually intensive tasks; therefore

this accomplishment is very significant. GM Bushee also thanked the Board for their leadership and support. GM Bushee noted that each employee is eligible to receive an incentive award of \$1,200.

The Board of Directors congratulated staff for their efforts.

GM Bushee also noted that the District's Board and staff received CSRMA jackets, survival kits, and plaques for winning the Super Safety Award and CSRMA Loss Control Program of the Year Award.

Upon a motion duly made by Director Sullivan, seconded by Director Hanson, and carried, the Board of Directors approved the consent calendar.

Director Sullivan reported on EWA's February 24, 2010 Board Meeting.

9. Committee Reports

A. Investment & Finance Committee (IFC) meeting was held on March 1, 2010.

Director Hanson reported that the IFC reviewed the early redemption option on the District's Encina Financing JPA Wastewater Revenue Refunding Bonds-1997 Series A. The Committee agreed with staff's recommendation to authorize the GM Bushee to exercise this option. She noted that this item will be reviewed by the Board later in tonight's meeting.

11. New Business

A. <u>Authorize the General Manager to execute an Agreement with Prizm Janitorial Services to provide janitorial services for the Administration and Operation Buildings in an amount not to exceed \$15,373.80 per year, for a three year contract totaling \$46,121.40 with an option to renew an additional two years.</u>

EA Hill presented the subject recommendation stating the reasons for requesting janitorial bids. She also provided information about the bid process including the number of bids that were received along with the results. EA Hill also noted that PM Morishita, Administrative Specialist Tianne Baity, Field Services Supervisor Jeff Stecker and she reviewed the three lowest bids. Based on the results, the team selected Prizm as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.

Following discussion, and upon a motion duly made by Director Sullivan, seconded by Director Kulchin, and carried, the Board of Directors authorized the General Manager to execute an agreement with Prizm Janitorial Services to provide janitorial services for the Administration and Operation Buildings in an amount not to exceed \$15,373.80 per year, for a three year contract totaling \$46,121.40 with an option to renew an additional two years.

B. <u>Authorize the General Manager to exercise an early redemption option on the District's Encina Financing JPA Wastewater Revenue Refunding Bonds-1997 Series A.</u>

GM Bushee noted that CPA Richard Duffey will present an overview of the early redemption option to the Board.

CPA Duffey provided a PowerPoint presentation that included the history of the bonds, the current interest rate, the balance of the bonds, and the benefit of saving money on interest if the District were to exercise the early redemption option. In addition, he described how the District could fund the early redemption option.

Following discussion, and upon a motion duly made by Director Kulchin, seconded by Director Hanson, and carried, the Board of Directors authorized the General Manager to exercise an early redemption option on the District's Encina Financing JPA Wastewater Revenue Refunding Bonds-1997 Series A.

C. <u>Authorize the General Manager to execute a Purchase Order with Quality Chevrolet, Inc. in an amount of \$31,650.30 for the purchase of one (1) 2010 Chevrolet Pickup Truck (3/4 ton) to replace one similarly equipped District truck.</u>

FSM Schempp presented the subject recommendation stating that the District developed a replacement schedule for the District's fleet of 14 vehicles. Staff advertised for the replacement of two 2010 Chevrolet or GMC trucks and received only 1 bid for the ¾ ton truck. FSM Schempp stated that the reason for only one bid was because General Motors had stopped production of the 2010 diesels early to re-tool for 2011, and the 1-ton trucks were no longer available locally.

FSM Schempp stated that staff reviewed Quality Chevrolet's bid and determined that the pricing of the truck was inline with other dealer pricing and determined that Quality

Chevrolet was the lowest responsive responsible bidder for the $\frac{3}{4}$ ton truck at $\frac{5}{100}$ \$31,650.30.

Following discussion, and upon a motion duly made by Director Kulchin, seconded by Director Sullivan, and carried, the Board of Directors authorized the General Manager to execute a purchase order with Quality Chevrolet, Inc. in an amount of \$31,650.30 for the purchase of one (1) 2010 Chevrolet Pickup Truck (3/4 ton) to replace one similarly equipped District truck.

D. Call for Nominations to the CSDA Board of Directors Seat B.

GM Bushee state that the District received notification for the call for nomination to the CSDA Board of Directors Seat B. GM Bushee stated that staff has no recommendation on this item. GM Bushee noted that the District's region is region 6, and the incumbent is running for reelection.

Following discussion, the Board of Director agreed not to nominate anyone to the CSDA Board of Directors Seat B.

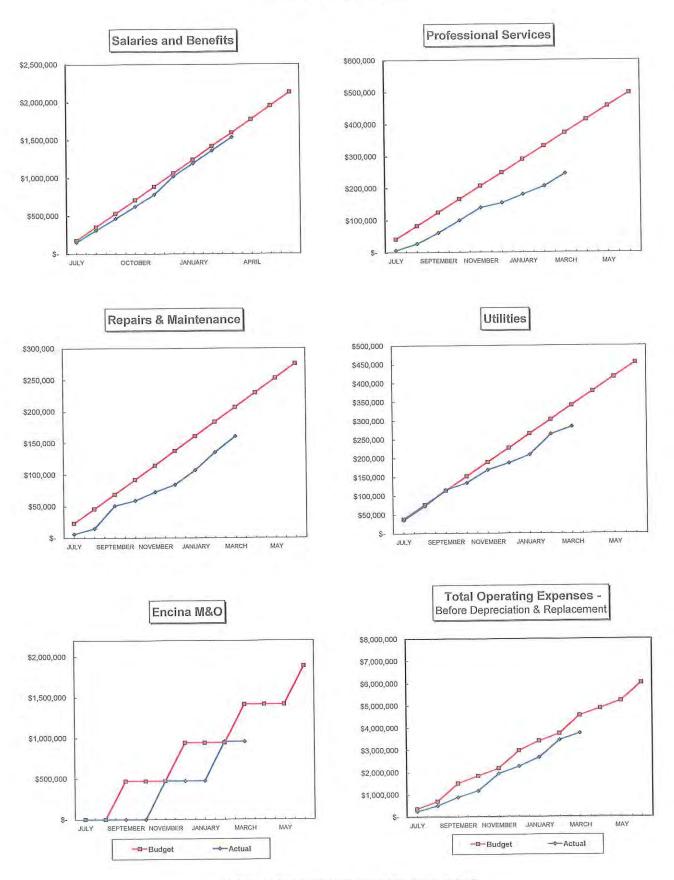
Leucadia Wastewater District Revenue FY 2010

YTD through March 31, 2010



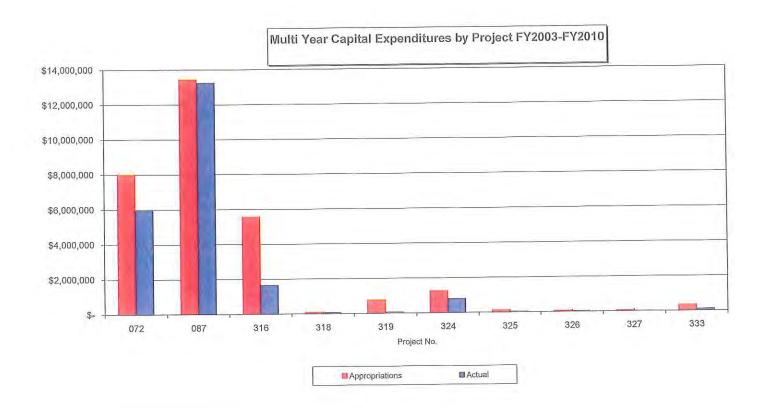

Project Proposed Change Order

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff and the Engineering Committee requests that the Board of Directors:

 Authorize the General Manager to approve a proposed change order with TC Construction Company, Inc. for additional work caused by unanticipated underground obstructions during the construction of the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project in an amount not to exceed \$32,099.77.

2. Discuss and take other action as appropriate.

DISCUSSION:

This item was reviewed by the Engineering Committee at its April 6, 2010 meeting. The Committee concurred with staff to bring this recommendation forward for consideration at today's meeting.

In October 2009, TC Construction Company, Inc. (TC Construction) commenced construction of the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project. In the early stage of the project, TC Construction installed a section of gravity sewer in Highway 101 and a section of the Diana Force Main in Vulcan Avenue. During excavation of the trench for the Highway 101 trunk sewer, TC Construction encountered a buried concrete road beneath the asphalt roadway. This unforeseen obstruction resulted in extra work to remove, break, haul away and dispose of the concrete which was in excess of one foot thick. The time and material costs for this work was \$20,128.05.

Simultaneously, TC Construction installed a section of the Diana Pump Station Force Main in Vulcan Avenue. While excavating the trench line, TC Construction encountered several unmarked utilities buried at various locations along the planned alignment. The cost of \$11,971.72 was incurred for additional labor and material needed to clear or avoid the obstructions.

The work and costs, totaling \$32,099.77, associated with this change order have been reviewed by Richard Stinson, Construction Manager, and are considered to be fair and reasonable. Therefore, Staff and the Engineering Committee recommend that the Board approve the proposed change order of \$32,099.77 for additional work required during installation of the Highway 101 gravity sewer and section of the Diana Pump Station Force Main. To date, two (2) change orders have been approved for a total of \$32,069. The approval of this change order

will result in a new change order total of \$64,168.77 which is 2.5% of the original contract amount of \$2,562,583.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There are sufficient funds in the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project construction account to cover this change order.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors:

 Consider General Counsel Brechtel's letter requesting a rate increase for general counsel services.

 If approved, authorize the Board President to execute an Agreement with Worden Williams APC increasing the rate for general counsel services from \$200 per hour to \$214 per hour.

3. Discuss and provide direction as appropriate.

DISCUSSION:

General Counsel Brechtel has transmitted a letter (Attachment 1), for the Board of Directors consideration, requesting a rate increase for general counsel services. The purpose of this agenda item is to provide the Board an opportunity to discuss Mr. Brechtel's letter and, if approved, authorize the Board President to execute an Employment Agreement with Worden Williams APC (Attachment 2).

The current rate paid by LWD for general counsel services is \$200 per hour. It was last adjusted in August 2006. Staff remains pleased with the performance, breadth and development of services provided by General Counsel Brechtel, his partners and associates. Additionally, staff recognizes value in its long-term relationship with Mr. Brechtel and the Worden Williams APC law firm. To assist the Board in its discussion, a survey of general counsel and/or special counsel rates for various public agencies is provided (Attachment 3).

The fiscal impact of this request is dependent upon the level of services requested of the General Counsel. The proposed rate of \$214 per hour reflects a 7% increase over the current rate. Assuming LWD's use of legal services remains consistent, staff expects total billings to increase approximately \$3850 per year. The FY 2010 budget includes \$55,000 for general counsel expenses that is likely sufficient to support the requested increase.

If approved, this Employment Agreement will supersede all prior resolutions and employment agreements between the District and Worden Williams APC.

Dear Members of the Board:

I am respectfully requesting that the current rates for general counsel services be increased by 7%. Under this proposal, the rate for senior attorneys would increase from \$200 per hour to \$214 per hour, the rate for associate attorneys would increase from \$175 per hour to \$187 per hour, and the rate for paralegals would increase from \$110 per hour to \$117 per hour. The requested increase would be the first since 2006.

The proposed increase is designed to help Worden Williams cover the ever-increasing cost of maintaining a law firm, and at the same time remain competitive. In most instances, the rates charged by Worden Williams are far below what is charged by other firms that provide similar services. Also, I am aware of the District's obligation to act in a fiscally responsible manner. For this reason, I work closely with District staff to proactively avoid legal disputes whenever possible. The firm's long standing relationship with the District and depth of knowledge allows me to better understand what is needed so that I can continue to provide general counsel services in a professional and efficient manner.

All of us at Worden Williams are grateful for the opportunity to represent the District, and we appreciate the Board's consideration of this request.

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EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES LEUCADIA WASTEWATER DISTRICT

The LEUCADIA WASTEWATER DISTRICT, hereinafter referred to as the "District" and WORDEN, WILLIAMS APC, hereinafter referred to as "Attorney," hereby agree that Attorney will provide professional legal services to the District on the following basis:

1. COMPENSATION:

- a. <u>Hourly Compensation</u>. The District will pay Senior Attorneys at the rate of \$214.00 (Two Hundred and Fourteen Dollars and no/100) per hour for all work performed.
- b. <u>Associates/Law Clerks/Paralegals/Investigators:</u> The District shall compensate Attorney for work performed by associate attorneys, law clerks, paralegals, and investigative assistants in Attorney's office in accordance with the attached Billing Policy. All associate attorneys, law clerks, paralegals, and investigative assistants will work under the direct supervision and control of the Attorney. In the event that the rates charged to its private clients by Attorney for law clerks and other support staff are increased during the fiscal year, at such time the District shall pay Attorney such increased hourly rates, not to exceed the actual rate charged to Attorney's private clients.
- c. <u>Overhead</u>. Attorney shall provide all of its own overhead, including office space, secretarial, library, telephones, insurance, etc., at no cost to the District.
- d. <u>Billing</u>. Attorney shall provide District with detailed monthly statements indicating all work performed and time spent on District business. Costs advanced, if any, shall be shown as separate entries.

2. **DUTIES:**

Attorney's duties and responsibilities shall include the follows:

- a. Attendance at (1) all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors of the District; (2) "pre-meeting" meetings at the direction of the Board President or District Manager; and (3) any and all other meetings of any kind at the direction of the Board, Board President or District Manager.
- b. Preparation of ordinances, resolutions, contracts and the like, concerning District business;
- c. Preparation of legal opinions on matters concerning the District at the request of the Board, District Manager or Board Committees;
- d. Consultation with Board members and staff regarding matters of District business;
- e. Defense of the District in any litigation in which the District is named as a party Defendant, subject to the direction and control of the Board;
- f. Preparation and prosecution of any litigation at the direction of the Board where the District is to be Plaintiff; and

g. Any other activities as directed by the Board, the President, Board Committees or the District Manager.

3. <u>RESTRICTION</u>:

Attorney shall not initiate, compromise, settle or release any litigation in which the District is involved except as directed by the Board. Attorney shall not represent the District before any other governmental entity whether federal, state, or local unless so directed by the Board, the President, Board Committees or the District Manager.

4. ATTORNEY IS INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR:

Attorney acknowledges and agrees that Attorney and its agents are independent contractors and not employees of the District, for all purposes. As such, Attorney acknowledges and agrees that neither Attorney nor its agents are entitled to any of the benefits of the District's employee compensation plan, the sole compensation to Attorney and its agents being as provided in this Agreement.

5. PRIOR AGREEMENTS

This contract replaces and supersedes all previous contracts for legal services.

6. TERMINATION AND MODIFICATION:

This Agreement may be terminated by either party on thirty (30) days notice to the other party. This Agreement may be modified at any time by written amendment signed by both parties.

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors:

1. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

DISCUSSION:

Subsequent to a duly noticed Public Hearing, the Board of Directors adopted Ordinance No. 123 regarding the compensation of Directors on May 20, 2009. Pursuant to applicable sections of the California Water Code (CWC), the Ordinance, which adjusted Director's compensation from \$165 to \$173, became effective 90 days after adoption. This item is presented for the Board's discussion and other action as appropriate.

California Water Code Section 20202 provides for a 5% adjustment per calendar year following the operative date of the last adjustment. Since an adjustment occurred in 2009, the Board is eligible for an adjustment not to exceed 5%. The exact amount of the increase is at the Board's discretion.

A survey of Director's compensation for other agencies is attached for review.

Staff requests that the board discuss this item and, if an increase is recommended, authorize staff to prepare, notice and schedule a public hearing for the May 2010 Board meeting.

Appropriations will be included in the proposed FY 2011 budget to fund the resulting adjustment, if approved.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors:

1. Discuss and provide direction, as appropriate.

BACKGROUND:

In November 2009, Governor Schwarzenegger signed into law Senate Bill 2X7 otherwise known as the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 (Water Bond Act). The cornerstone of the Water Bond Act is an \$11.14 billion bond measure that will be placed on the November 2010 election ballot.

The Community Affairs Committee recently discussed whether the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) should support this bond measure. Director Kulchin also inquired about the Water Bond Act after reviewing information from the California Special Districts Association. Staff has since reviewed the Water Bond Act and offers the following information for your consideration.

DISCUSSION

The Water Bond Act has been designed to provide funding to: 1) repair and replace the State's aging water infrastructure; 2) to ensure a safe and reliable water supply; and 3) to address environmental issues associated with the supply of water especially in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Bay Delta area. The question for LWD is whether the Water Bond Act, if approved, would have any direct benefits relating to LWD's wastewater and recycled water services. The short answer is yes, the Water Bond Act could provide funding for LWD projects especially in the area of recycled water.

The Water Bond Act would essentially allocate the \$11.14B across 7 broad areas, which are summarized in the following table:

Category	Bond Allocation Amount
Conservation and Watershed Protection	\$1.785 billion
Drought Relief	\$455 million
Delta Sustainability	\$2.25 billion
Water Supply Reliability	\$1.4 billion
Statewide Water System Improvements	\$3.0 billion
Groundwater Protection and Water Quality	\$1.0 billion
Water Recycling and Water Conservation	\$1.25 billion

Of the \$11.14 billion bond measure, roughly \$3.1 billion can be found in the highlighted areas of Drought Relief; Water Supply Reliability; and Water Recycling which include funding provisions for recycled water and wastewater projects. It is important to note that the wastewater funding appears to be relatively minor and would only be available for projects in very small communities, thereby having no direct benefit to LWD.

The Water Bond Act contains a myriad of special project funding directives that are too numerous to summarize in this report. The Act does specify that the San Diego region would receive \$87 million of the \$1.4 billion allocated to the Water Supply Reliability category. Attached for your review, please find a more detailed summary of the Water Bond Act from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB).

The Bond Measure:

If the \$11.14 billion bond measure is approved this coming November, it is staff's understanding that the bonds would *not* be issued all at once but staggered over a period of time. However, of the seven funding areas identified in the Act, staff found only one category, the Statewide Water System Improvements (\$3.0 billion), where issuance of the bonds would be delayed. Staff is unaware of the exact timing of the bond issuances for the remaining 6 categories.

Critics of the bond measure have expressed concern that California would issue more debt at a time when the State is facing an estimated \$20 billion budget shortfall. On the other hand, California's aging water infrastructure and water supply issues clearly need to be addressed sooner rather than later. Although not perfect, the Water Bond Act does address the critical areas of: 1) aging and failing infrastructure; 2) water conservation; 3) ecosystem and environmental concerns; 4) water quality; and 5) the development of new and reliable water sources. In the absence of a better solution to address the State's ongoing water issues, staff believes there is merit for LWD to support the \$11.14 billion measure in the upcoming November election.

To date, several water agencies have endorsed the water bond measure including: the San Diego County Water Authority, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, the Santa Fe Irrigation District and the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA)

Next Step:

In summary, the Water Bond Act does contain a direct nexus to LWD's water recycling and wastewater programs and support for the bond measure has merit. Ultimately, the decision whether LWD should support the water bond measure is a policy issue that rests in the hands of the Board of Directors. Therefore, today's recommendation is for the Board to discuss this issue and provide direction to staff. If the Board determines that LWD support for the bond measure is warranted, staff plans to develop a resolution of support that would be considered by the Board at its May 2010 meeting.

WATER BOND SUMMARY

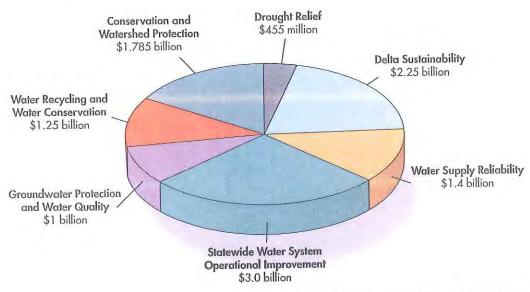
NOVEMBER 2009

The Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 is an \$11.14 billion general obligation bond proposal that would provide funding for California's aging water infrastructure and for projects and programs to address the ecosystem and water supply issues in California. The bond is comprised of seven categories, including drought relief, water supply reliability, Delta sustainability, statewide water system operational improvement, conservation and watershed protection, groundwater protection and water quality, and water recycling and water conservation.

Total: \$11.14 billion

Drought Relief - \$455 million. This funding will be available for local and regional drought relief projects that reduce the impacts of drought conditions, including the impacts of reductions to Delta diversions. Projects will include water conservation and water use efficiency projects, water recycling, groundwater cleanup and other water supply reliability projects including local surface water storage projects that provide emergency water supplies and water supply reliability in drought conditions. Funds will be available to disadvantaged communities and economically distressed areas experiencing economic impacts from the drought for drought relief projects and programs. Funds will also be available to improve wastewater treatment facilities to protect water quality or prevent contamination of surface water or groundwater resources.

Delta Sustainability - \$2.25 billion. This bond will provide funds for projects to assist in maintaining and restoring the Delta as an important ecosystem. These investments will help to reduce the seismic risk to water supplies derived from the Delta, protect drinking water quality and reduce conflict between water management and environmental protection.

Water Supply Reliability - \$1.4 billion. These funds would be in addition to prior funding provided by Proposition 50 and Proposition 84 and would support the existing Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) program. IRWM is designed to encourage integrated regional strategies for management of water resources that will protect communities from drought, protect and improve water quality and improve local water security by reducing dependence on imported water. The bond would provide funds for water supply projects in 12 regions throughout the state and would also be available for local and regional conveyance projects that support regional and interregional connectivity and water management.

Statewide Water System Operational Improvement - \$3.0 billion. This funding would be dedicated to the development of additional water storage, which, when combined with other water management and flood system improvement investments being made, can increase reliability and offset the climate change impacts of reduced snow pack and higher flood flows. Eligible projects for this funding include surface storage projects identified in the CALFED Bay-Delta Record of Decision; groundwater storage projects and groundwater contamination prevention or remediation projects that provide water storage benefits; conjunctive use and reservoir reoperation projects; local and regional surface storage projects that improve the operation of water systems in the state and provide public benefits.

The bond provides that water suppliers who would benefit from new storage will pay their share of the total costs of the project while the public benefits of new water storage can be paid for by this general obligation bond.

Groundwater Protection and Water Quality - \$1 billion. To protect public health, funds will be available for projects to prevent or reduce the contamination of groundwater that serves as a source of drinking water. Funds will also be used to finance emergency and urgent actions on behalf of disadvantaged communities and economically distressed areas to ensure that safe drinking water supplies are available to all Californians.

SAFE, CLEAN, AND RELIABLE DRINKING WATER SUPPLY ACT OF 2010

NOVEMBER 2009

Water Recycling and Water Conservation - \$1.25 billion. Funds will be available for water recycling and advanced treatment technology projects that recycle water or that remove salts and contaminants from water sources. Funds will also be available for urban and agricultural water conservation and water use efficiency plans, projects, and programs. These funds will assist urban water users in achieving water conservation targets.

Conservation and Watershed Protection - \$1.785 billion. Funds will be available for ecosystem and watershed protection and restoration projects in 21 watersheds throughout the state, including coastal protection, wildlife refuge enhancement, fuel treatment and forest restoration, fish passage improvement and obsolete dam removal.

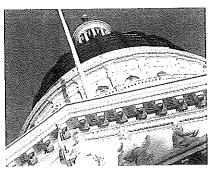

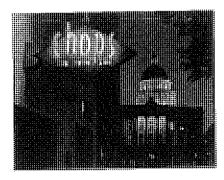
