A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) was held Wednesday, April 14, 2010 at 5:00 p.m., at the District Administration Office at 1960 La Costa Ave., Carlsbad, California.

President Juliussen called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

Upon a motion duly made by Director Sullivan, seconded by Director Kulchin, and carried, the Board of Directors approved the consent calendar with the amended CAC minutes.

GM Bushee reported on the MAM's April 14, 2010 meeting.

# 9. Committee Reports

A. Community Affairs Committee (CAC) meeting was held on March 23, 2010.

Director Sullivan reported that the CAC reviewed and commented on the summer 2010 newsletter story ideas and production schedule. Director Sullivan also reported on the list of story ideas that the newsletter will include.

B. Engineering Committee (EC) meeting was held on April 6, 2010.

Director Kulchin reported that the EC reviewed the recommendation to approve a proposed change order with TC Construction Company for additional work caused by unanticipated underground obstructions during the construction of the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains, and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project. The EC agreed with staff to bring this item to the Board of Director's for approval.

Director Kulchin also reported that the EC reviewed the Preliminary FY 2011 Capital Acquisition and Capital Improvement Program Budgets. No action was taken at the meeting.

In addition, PM Morishita provided an update on Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains, and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project.

# A. Health Reform Update.

ASM LeMay presented the subject stating that during March congress passed a Health Care bill that may impact District benefits. ASM LeMay introduced Mr. Randy Pickering of Pickering Insurance Services to present the Board with an overview of the Health Care reform and how it may impact the District.

Mr. Pickering distributed handouts to the Board and provided an overview of the Health Reform Act. Mr. Pickering described when certain provisions of the Act will take effect and how it may affect employers; taxes; flexible spending accounts; and its providers.

B. Authorize the General Manager to approve a proposed change order with TC Construction Company, Inc. for additional work caused by unanticipated underground obstructions during the construction of the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project in an amount not to exceed \$32,099.71

PM Morishita presented the subject recommendation. He stated that the EC reviewed this item at its April 6, 2010 meeting and the EC concurred with staff's recommendation to bring this item to the Board of Directors at tonight's meeting.

PM Morishita stated that during the excavation of the trench for the Highway 101 trunk sewer, TC Construction encountered a buried concrete road beneath the asphalt roadway. This obstruction resulted in extra work to remove, break, haul away, and dispose of the one foot thick concrete. The total cost for this work is \$20,128.05. In addition, TC Construction encountered unmarked underground utilities that needed to be cleared or avoided, which cost \$11,971.72 for the additional labor and material. PM Morishita noted that Construction Manager Richard Stinson reviewed this change order and agreed that the total cost of 32,099.77 is fair and reasonable. PM Morishita stated the new cost of the original agreement and he also noted that there are sufficient funds in the budget to cover the additional costs.

Following discussion, and upon a motion duly made by Director Hanson, seconded by Director Sullivan, and carried, the Board of Directors authorized the General Manager to approve a proposed change order with TC Construction Company, Inc. for additional work caused by unanticipated underground obstructions during the construction of the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project in an amount not to exceed \$32,099.71.

#### C. Rate Increase for General Counsel Services.

ASM LeMay presented the subject recommendation stating that staff received a letter from General Counsel Brechtel requesting an increase in General Counsel services.

ASM LeMay stated the last increase for General Counsel services was in August 2006 and his current rate is \$200 per hour. General Counsel Brechtel is requesting a 7% rate increase to \$214 per hour and the FY 2010 budget is sufficient to fund the increase. ASM LeMay also noted staff included in the Board of Director's agenda

material a recent survey conducted of General Counsel rates at various public agencies for the Board's information.

ASM LeMay also stated that staff is pleased with General Counsel Brechtel performances and services, along with his partners and associates.

General Counsel Brechtel addressed the Board and reasons for the proposed increase. In addition, Mr. Brechtel stated that he appreciates the opportunity to work with the District.

Following discussion, and upon a motion duly made by Director Sullivan, seconded by Director Kulchin, and carried, the Board of Directors authorized the Board President to execute an Agreement with Worden Williams APC increasing the rate for General Counsel services from \$200 per hour to \$214 per hour.

# D. Board of Directors Compensation Adjustment.

ASM LeMay presented the subject item stating that the Board of Directors approved Ordinance No. 123 increasing the Board's stipend from \$165 to \$173 in 2009. ASM LeMay noted that this item is presented for the Board's discussion and if appropriate, to direct to staff to prepare, notice and schedule a public hearing for the May 2010 Board meeting.

Director Kulchin stated that he is in favor of the rates remaining the same. President Juliussen agreed with Director Kulchin stating in this economic time, its best not to increase the Board stipend.

The Board agreed not to prepare, notice, and schedule a public hearing for increasing the Board's stipend.

# E. Report on the Water Bond Bill.

GM Bushee presented a PowerPoint overview of the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 (Water Bond Act). GM Bushee noted that this item was discussed at the Community Affairs Committee to determine if the District should support this bill. GM Bushee stated that if the bill does include funding for wastewater and recycled water projects, which could benefit LWD. GM Bushee provided a list of agencies that are supporting the water bond act, and indicated that staff would prepare a resolution of support if the Board desires to do so.

Director Sullivan stated that she believes there is not enough information for LWD to support the water bond act. President Juliussen stated he would like to see if CASA provides more information about the bond at its upcoming conference and whether they will support it. Director Kulchin would like to know what the timeframe is for LWD to support the bond. GM Bushee state that there is no immediate timeline to support this and staff can present more information on the water bond at the next Board meeting. The water bond act will be on the November ballot.

Director Omsted stated that the article in the newsletter that discusses the water bond

should be neutral and only provide information about the water bond.

General Counsel Brechtel noted that the Board of Directors cannot advocate their position in the newsletter, but can provide impartial information.

No action was taken.

A. Receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by RFYeager Engineering.

PM Morishita presented the recommendation stating the background information for the development of the report.

The EC discussed the report. Following discussion, the EC concurred with staff to forward this recommendation to the Board of Directors for consideration at its May 19<sup>th</sup> meeting.

B. <u>Authorize the General Manager to execute Amendment No. 2 to the Dudek Construction Management Services Agreement for the Site Improvement Project in an amount not to exceed \$120,000.</u>

PM Morishita presented the recommendation. PM Morishita provided information on the original agreement with Dudek, Amendment No. 1, and the contract's scope of work. PM Morishita provided a brief summary of additional work provided by Dudek's Construction Management (CM) team and the team's excellent CM and inspection services throughout the project. Staff met with Dudek and negotiated a price of \$120,000 and staff believes this contract amendment is fair and reasonable. PM Morishita also noted that there is sufficient funding in the Site Improvement Account to cover the additional cost.

Following discussion, the EC concurred with staff to forward this recommendation to the Board of Directors for consideration at its May 19<sup>th</sup> meeting.

# C. Final Fiscal Year 2011 (FY 11) Capital Budget Review.

PM Morishita reviewed the draft final FY 11 Capital Acquisition Program and Capital Improvement Program budgets with the EC. He noted that changes from the preliminary capital budget included additional appropriations for the Encina Wastewater Authority capital budget; external force main corrosion protection; and a drought tolerant conservation garden.

The EC discussed the final FY 11 Capital Budget in detail. The EC expressed concerns over the additional appropriation for the drought tolerant conservation garden which was \$106,050. PM Morishita explained the concept of the garden and how it evolved. The EC was concerned with the overall benefit of the garden as it relates to the estimated construction cost of \$50,000-\$60,000.

Following discussion, the EC requested that this item be placed on the May 19, 2010 Board agenda for further discussion and direction.

# D. Report on the Batiquitos Force Main (B2) Break.

FSM Schempp presented a summary of the recent wastewater spill on the Batiquitos Force Main (B2). FSM Schempp noted that of the approximately 10,000 gallons spilled, all of it was contained and returned to the sewer system at a downstream location. None of the wastewater reached the Batiquitos Lagoon or the adjacent lease tern nesting area.

# Leucadia Wastewater District Revenue FY 2010



# Leucadia Wastewater District Operating Expenses FY 2010





As of April 30, 2010










#### RECOMMENDATION:

Staff and the Engineering Committee requests that the Board of Directors:

1. Receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by RFYeager Engineering.

2. Discuss and take other action as appropriate.

#### DISCUSSION:

This item was reviewed by the Engineering Committee at its May 10, 2010 meeting. The Committee concurred with staff to bring this item forward for consideration.

In November 2008, the Board of Directors authorized the execution of an agreement with Dexter Wilson Engineering (DWE) to develop the Force Main Corrosion Study. As you may recall, this study was part of the Fiscal Year 2009 Tactical Plan and the genesis of this study was the major sewage spill that occurred at the Buena Vista Pump Station. The cause of that spill was determined to be undetected corrosion of the force main which weakened the pipe. To prevent this occurrence in the District's collection system, an assessment of the condition of the District's major force mains was part of the Asset Management Master Plan implementation. The primary objective of the study was to develop a logical plan to facilitate this assessment. The study was completed by DWE and accepted by the Board in August 2009.

As part of the plan to assess the force mains, the study recommended that an external cathodic protection evaluation be conducted on all four force mains. RFYeager Engineering (RFY) was hired to conduct the external evaluation with oversight by DWE. The summary of results of the RFY evaluation is as follows:

Force Main L1 (Installed in 1979. Ductile iron. Leucadia Pump Station to Highway 101)

- L1 has partial electrical continuity from Leucadia Pump Station (PS) to Saxony PS and is electrically discontinuous from Saxony PS to the discharge.
- L1 has cathodic protection (sacrificial anodes) from Leucadia PS to I-5. Cathodic test station (CTS) readings show good protection along this length; however, L1 has two damaged CTS and one missing CTS in this section.
- L1 has no cathodic protection from I-5 to Highway 101.

Force Main L2 (Installed in three phases, from 1994 to 2002. PVC pipe with some sections of metallic pipe (steel and ductile iron). Leucadia Pump Station to Highway 101)

- L2 is primarily non-metallic with short metallic sections throughout.
- There is electrical continuity across all the metal sections.
- All metal sections have cathodic protection (sacrificial anodes).
- Readings indicate good protection from Leucadia PS to I-5.
- Readings indicate anodes from I-5 to Highway 101 should be replaced and one CTS is missing in this section.

<u>Force Main B2</u> (Installed in 1979. Ductile iron. Batiquitos Pump Station to North Lanikai Gravity Interceptor)

- B2 has electrical continuity across its length, except at the above-grade San Marcos Creek bridge crossing.
- B2, as originally installed, has no cathodic protection.
- In 2000, when Highway 101 was widened, sacrificial anodes were added at two stations but were not activated. RFY activated them during their field work.
- One CTS is missing from B2.

<u>Force Main B3</u> (Installed in 1988. Ductile Iron. Batiquitos Pump Station to North Lanikai Gravity Interceptor)

- The electrical continuity of B3 between Batiquitos PS and the above-grade San Marcos Creek bridge crossing is unknown.
- B3 has electrical continuity from the north end of the bridge crossing to the Lanikai Interceptor.
- B3, as originally installed, has no cathodic protection.
- In 2000, when Highway 101 was widened, sacrificial anodes were added at three stations but were not activated. RFY activated them during their field work.
- There is one CTS missing at Batiquitos PS and one missing at the force main discharge.

Based on the results of the RFY evaluation, DWE recommends the following:

- 1. Designate the force mains from each of the pump stations as either primary or secondary. It is recommended that the newest force mains, L2 and B3, be designated as the primary force mains and the older, L1 and B2, force mains as secondary. This will help guide prioritization of improvements and the scope of expenditures for each force main. Inspections and upgrades would first focus on the primary force mains. Please keep in mind that all four force mains will continue to be maintained and used.
- 2. The plan to improve the external cathodic protection of the force mains, with approximate cost of design and construction shown in parentheses, is as follows:
  - On the primary force mains (L2 and B3), locate the three missing CTS and repair four damaged CTS (\$10,500)
  - On primary force main L2, replace anodes from I-5 to Highway 101 (\$30,000)
  - On primary force main B3, add cathodic protection (sacrificial anodes) along entire length (\$40,000)
  - On secondary force main B2, add cathodic protection (sacrificial anodes) along entire length (\$40,000)
  - On secondary force mains (L1 and B2), repair two damaged CTS and locate three missing CTS (\$7,500)
  - Approximate total cost \$150,000 (\$128,000 plus contingency)

It should be noted that these cathodic protection improvements address only the external corrosion protection of the force mains. Funds to complete the above recommendations have been requested as part of the Fiscal Year 2011 Capital Budget. The next phase of the force main corrosion plan will focus on the evaluation of internal corrosion of the force mains.

The DWE's memo summarizing RFY's findings and presenting recommendations is attached. In addition, Natalie Fraschetti, Dexter Wilson Engineering, will attend the Board meeting to present the conclusions and recommendations of the study.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

At the Engineering Committee (EC) meeting on May 10, 2010, the EC discussed the final Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 Capital Budget in detail. During the discussion, the EC expressed concerns over the additional appropriation for a drought tolerant conservation/demonstration garden with a budget of \$106,050. As you may recall, the 7,980 square feet area to the east of the front site wall (old District Office site) was identified as the ideal location for a replacement pump station, if one was needed in the future. Therefore, the site was left open in the Site Improvement Plan and was to be covered with decomposed granite during the Site Improvement Project construction. As construction progressed, it was suggested that the area be used for a drought tolerant/native plant garden. Due to the current economic climate, the EC voiced concern with the overall benefit of the garden as it relates to the estimated construction cost of \$50,000-\$60,000. Staff and the EC agreed to bring this item to the Board for discussion and direction.

Enclosed please find the Recommended FY 11 Budget for your review. Staff will present an overview of the proposed budget at the upcoming meeting. Highlights of the budget are as follows:

- 1) The Wastewater Service Charge is projected to increase 10% from \$234.74/EDU/YR to \$258.21/EDU/YR
- 2) Expenses are allocated to the following primary programs:
  - a. Wastewater Enterprise
  - b. Batiquitos Pump Station
  - c. Recycled Water Enterprise
  - d. Capital Program
- 3) Administrative service costs have been allocated to the four programs above as overhead.
- 4) Development Expenses have been included as a separate program.
- 5) The FY 11 Capital Improvement Program Budget includes funding for the District's native plant garden, the Batiquitos Pump Station Rehabilitation Project, the Force-main Corrosion Project, and pipeline repair/replacement projects recommended in the Asset Management Master Plan.

The Capital Budget was reviewed by the Engineering Committee at its April 1, 2010 and May 10, 2010 meetings. The Personnel Budget was reviewed by the Human Resources Committee on April 20, 2010. Staff will incorporate feedback from the Board into the final budget scheduled to be considered by the Board on June 9, 2010.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

#### BACKGROUND:

At its April 14, 2010 meeting, the Board of Directors discussed whether to support the Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 (Water Bond Act). The Board opted to defer any decision on the Water Bond Act pending discussion at the California Association of Sanitation Agencies conference, which was held from April 28-30, 2010. The Board also requested that staff provide supplementary information on the Water Bond Act to aid in its decision.

In regards to the CASA, there was very little discussion of the Water Bond Act at the conference, and CASA has *not* taken a position on this issue. CASA Lobbyist Michael Dillon did mention that the Water Bond Act contains potential funding for recycled water projects.

In regards to supplementary information, staff has researched this issue and found excellent summary information on the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) website. Attached for your review, please find the following:

- LWD staff report from the April 10, 2010 Board of Directors meeting
- ACWA's Comprehensive Legislative Water Package Overview
- ACWA's Water Bond Act Fact Sheet
- ACWA's Water Bond Act "Frequently Asked Questions"
- ACWA's Regional Funding Information (excerpts for Southern California)

Staff hopes this supplementary information helps aid with the Board's decision on this matter. Today's recommendation is for the Board to discuss this issue and provide direction to staff. If the Board determines that LWD support for the bond measure is warranted, staff plans to develop a resolution of support that would be considered by the Board at its June 2010 meeting.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors:

1. Discuss and provide direction, as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND:

In November 2009, Governor Schwarzenegger signed into law Senate Bill 2X7 otherwise known as the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 (Water Bond Act). The cornerstone of the Water Bond Act is an \$11.14 billion bond measure that will be placed on the November 2010 election ballot.

The Community Affairs Committee recently discussed whether the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) should support this bond measure. Director Kulchin also inquired about the Water Bond Act after reviewing information from the California Special Districts Association. Staff has since reviewed the Water Bond Act and offers the following information for your consideration.

#### DISCUSSION

The Water Bond Act has been designed to provide funding to: 1) repair and replace the State's aging water infrastructure; 2) to ensure a safe and reliable water supply; and 3) to address environmental issues associated with the supply of water especially in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Bay Delta area. The question for LWD is whether the Water Bond Act, if approved, would have any direct benefits relating to LWD's wastewater and recycled water services. The short answer is yes, the Water Bond Act could provide funding for LWD projects especially in the area of recycled water.

The Water Bond Act would essentially allocate the \$11.14B across 7 broad areas, which are summarized in the following table:

Category	Bond Allocation Amount
Conservation and Watershed Protection Drought Relief Delta Sustainability Water Supply Reliability Statewide Water System Improvements Groundwater Protection and Water Quality Water Recycling and Water Conservation	\$1.785 billion \$455 million \$2.25 billion \$1.4 billion \$3.0 billion \$1.0 billion \$1.25 billion

Of the \$11.14 billion bond measure, roughly \$3.1 billion can be found in the highlighted areas of Drought Relief; Water Supply Reliability; and Water Recycling which include funding provisions for recycled water and wastewater projects. It is important to note that the wastewater funding appears to be relatively minor and would only be available for projects in very small communities, thereby having no direct benefit to LWD.

The Water Bond Act contains a myriad of special project funding directives that are too numerous to summarize in this report. The Act does specify that the San Diego region would receive \$87 million of the \$1.4 billion allocated to the Water Supply Reliability category. Attached for your review, please find a more detailed summary of the Water Bond Act from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB).

#### The Bond Measure:

If the \$11.14 billion bond measure is approved this coming November, it is staff's understanding that the bonds would *not* be issued all at once but staggered over a period of time. However, of the seven funding areas identified in the Act, staff found only one category, the Statewide Water System Improvements (\$3.0 billion), where issuance of the bonds would be delayed. Staff is unaware of the exact timing of the bond issuances for the remaining 6 categories.

Critics of the bond measure have expressed concern that California would issue more debt at a time when the State is facing an estimated \$20 billion budget shortfall. On the other hand, California's aging water infrastructure and water supply issues clearly need to be addressed sooner rather than later. Although not perfect, the Water Bond Act does address the critical areas of: 1) aging and failing infrastructure; 2) water conservation; 3) ecosystem and environmental concerns; 4) water quality; and 5) the development of new and reliable water sources. In the absence of a better solution to address the State's ongoing water issues, staff believes there is merit for LWD to support the \$11.14 billion measure in the upcoming November election.

To date, several water agencies have endorsed the water bond measure including: the San Diego County Water Authority, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, the Santa Fe Irrigation District and the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA)

#### Next Step:

In summary, the Water Bond Act does contain a direct nexus to LWD's water recycling and wastewater programs and support for the bond measure has merit. Ultimately, the decision whether LWD should support the water bond measure is a policy issue that rests in the hands of the Board of Directors. Therefore, today's recommendation is for the Board to discuss this issue and provide direction to staff. If the Board determines that LWD support for the bond measure is warranted, staff plans to develop a resolution of support that would be considered by the Board at its May 2010 meeting.



## Historic Package Marks Shift to New Era in Water Policy


The California Legislature passed a far-reaching legislative package on water in November 2009. The package, signed into law by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, is aimed at improving the state's water supply reliability and restoring the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta ecosystem.

The package includes four policy bills and an \$11.14 billion bond measure targeted for the November 2010 ballot. The policy bills advance the co-equal goals of a reliable water supply and a healthy Delta ecosystem and establish a new structure for managing the Delta. The bills also establish new requirements for water conservation, groundwater monitoring, and water rights enforcement to address illegal diversions of water.

The bond measure includes substantial funding for water supply reliability, surface and groundwater storage, Delta restoration, water recycling, conservation, watershed restoration, groundwater protection and cleanup, and drought relief.

## A Water System in Crisis

The legislative package marks a critical step toward addressing California's ongoing water supply challenges. The Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, the hub of the state's water system, is in an ecological crisis that has led to historic restrictions on water deliveries and threatens California's economy and species such as salmon and Delta smelt.

In addition, aging levees that protect the Delta are a risk of a major failure that could cripple water deliveries for an extended period and flood communities and farmland.

Regulatory actions to protect species have reduced water deliveries from the state's two largest water systems in recent years to more than 25 million people in the San Francisco Bay Area, Central and Southern California.

The reductions, combined with three consecutive drought years, have compelled more than 60 local water agencies to impose some form of mandatory conservation. Growers in some regions have been forced to fallow significant acreage, contributing to unemployment and economic woes in several communities.

Climate change is reducing our mountain snow pack — a critical source of natural water storage—and may usher in longer droughts and more severe floods in the future.

#### Delta Governance / Delta Plan

The final legislative package is highly consistent with policy principles adopted by the ACWA Board of Directors.

SB 7X 1 establishes a framework to achieve the co-equal goals of providing a more reliable water supply and restoring the Delta ecosystem. It creates a new governance structure that is consistent with ACWA policy principles.

#### Delta Stewardship Council

- Seven members with a statewide view
- Adopts Delta Plan to implement co-equal goals
- Incorporates Bay-Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP)

#### **Delta Protection Commission**

- 15 members, with a majority from the Delta
- Land-use authority
- Develops economic sustainability plan for Delta

#### Delta Conservancy

- 11 members, including five Delta counties
- Primary agency to implement ecosystem restoration projects

#### In-Stream Flows Identification

- Dept, of Fish and Game and State Water Resources Control Board identify flow requirements for Delta
- Planning function, not regulatory proceeding



## **Groundwater Monitoring**

SB 7X 6 includes new requirements for local agencies to monitor the elevation of groundwater basins to assist in managing the resource. Monitoring will begin on Jan. 1, 2012.

- DWR sets priority schedule for monitoring and review
- Local agencies determine how to best implement regionally
- Agencies that do not implement lose eligibility for grant funds
- DWR may implement monitoring for region if locals opt not to do so



## Statewide Water Conservation

SB 7X 7 establishes a statewide water conservation program that requires a 20% reduction in urban per-capita water use by 2020. The bill requires development of agricultural water management plans by Dec. 31, 2012.

- Multiple pathways for compliance, including an incentive-based option to be developed by DWR by Dec. 31, 2010
- Interim target to be met by Dec. 1, 2015
- Task force to develop BMPs for commercial, industrial and institutional sector
- Standardized reporting system to be developed
- Agencies that do not meet goal lose eligibility for grant funding


## Water Diversion / Water Rights Enforcement

SB 7X 8 provides for stronger accounting for water diversions and water use by recasting and redefining exemptions for reporting requirements under current law. It also appropriates existing bond funding for ecosystem and water supply reliability projects and for additional State Water Resources Control Board staff.

- Addresses illegal diversions
- Redefines diversions exempt from reporting requirements
- Appropriates \$546 million from Propositions 1E
   and 84 for grants for various activities
- Appropriates \$3.75 million to the State Water Resources Control Board for staff positions in water rights enforcement

## Safe Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010

The Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 is an \$11.14 billion general obligation bond measure for the November 2010 ballot that would provide funding for California's aging water infrastructure and for projects and programs to improve water supply and ecosystem health. If approved by voters, the bond would provide funding in seven categories: drought relief, water supply reliability, Delta sustainability, statewide water system operational improvement, conservation and watershed protection, groundwater protection and water quality, and water recycling and water conservation.

#### Central Coast

Would receive \$58 million for Water Supply Reliability programs and projects.



The Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 is an \$11.14 billion general obligation bond measure set for the November 2010 ballot. If approved by voters, the measure would provide funding for California's aging water infrastructure and for projects and programs to improve water supply reliability and ecosystem health.


#### Key funding areas include:

#### Drought relief: \$455 million

l'unding for local and regional projects such as water conservation / efficiency, water recycling, groundwater cleanup and local surface water storage.

#### Water supply reliability: \$1.4 billion

Assistance and funding for safe drinking water, water recycling, local surface storage, stormwater management, and other projects.



#### Delta sustainability: \$2.25 billion

Funding to maintain and restore the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, the troubled hub of the statewide water delivery system. Investments would address seismic risk, protect water quality and protect habitat.

#### Groundwater cleanup and protection: \$1 billion

Funding for projects to prevent or reduce groundwater contamination and emergency actions to ensure safe drinking water, especially in economically distressed communities

## Storage and statewide water system improvement: \$3 billion

Funding continuously appropriated for projects, including surface and groundwater storage to allow the state to capture water in wet years for use in dry years.

## Water recycling and water conservation: \$1.25 billion

Funding for recycling and advanced treatment projects as well as programs to help meet the state's goal of a 20% reduction in per-capita water use by 2020.

#### Conservation and watershed protection: \$1.79 billion

Funding for coastal protection, fish passage, wildlife refuges and river restoration.

## Part of Historic Legislative Package on Water

The Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 is part of a landmark legislative package on water approved by the California Legislature and signed by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger in November 2009. The package addressed long-term improvements in statewide water management, water reliability and ecosystem health.

## Q: What is the Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010?

A: The Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 is an \$11.14 billion general obligation bond measure set for the November 2010 ballot. If approved by voters, the measure would provide funding for California's aging water infrastructure and for projects and programs to improve water supply reliability and ecosystem health.

The Legislature voted to put the measure on the ballot as part of the historic water package enacted in a special legislative session on water in November 2009. In addition to the bond measure, the package included legislation establishing a new governance structure for the Delta and new requirements for water conservation, groundwater monitoring and water rights enforcement.

#### Q: What kinds of projects would the bond measure fund?

A: It would provide funding for local and regional projects such as water conservation and water use efficiency, water recycling, groundwater cleanup, local surface storage, stormwater management and desalination. It would also provide funding for surface and groundwater storage projects, ecosystem restoration and watershed protection.

#### Q: Why do we need a water bond now?

A: Experts agree that California's aging water storage and delivery system can no longer meet the state's needs. Originally built to serve a population of just 18 million, the system is struggling to meet the needs of 38 million Californians today. The state's population is expected to reach 50 million by 2032.

In addition, environmental problems in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, the hub of our state's water system, have triggered major cutbacks in water deliveries for many areas of the state. The cutbacks, combined with the effects of three consecutive drought years, have compelled more than 60 local agencies to impose mandatory conservation and forced growers to fallow more than 300,000 acres of farmland in hard-hit areas. The cutbacks will continue regardless of whether the state receives adequate rainfall.

Climate change and the mounting risk of a widespread levee failure in the Delta also threaten our water supply reliability.

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#### Q: How would the bond measure address these problems?

A: The bond measure would provide funding for projects and programs throughout the state to increase water supply reliability, address ecological problems in the Delta, add operational flexibility to the state's water storage and delivery system and expand water recycling and conservation. These investments and programs together represent the comprehensive approach experts agree is needed to improve both water supply reliability and ecosystem health in the Delta.

Unlike other water bonds approved in recent years, the Safe, Clean and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 includes funding to develop additional water storage (both surface and groundwater projects) and to improve the operation of the state's water system. Water suppliers that would benefit from the new storage would be required to pay their share of project costs while bond funds would be used for the public benefit portion of new storage.

#### Q: How would the funds for water storage be allocated?

A: The bond measure calls for \$3 billion to be continuously appropriated to the California Water Commission to fund the public benefits associated with water storage projects that improve the operation of the state water system, are cost-effective and provide a net improvement in ecosystem and water quality conditions. Funds would be awarded through a competitive process based on expected returns on public investment.

Eligible projects would include surface storage projects such as the proposed Sites Reservoir near Maxwell in the Sacramento Valley, expansion of Los Vaqueros reservoir in Contra Costa County, the proposed Temperance Flat reservoir above Millerton Lake on the San Joaquin River, various groundwater storage projects, conjunctive use and reservoir reoperation projects, and local and regional storage projects.

Public benefits associated with new storage could include ecosystem improvements including timing, amount and temperature of flows for fisheries; water quality improvements in and upstream of the Delta; flood control; emergency response; and recreation. Ecosystem benefits must account for 50% of the total public benefit per project.

## Q: Does the bond include funding for a peripheral canal or other conveyance in the Delta?

A: No. The bond specifically prohibits the use of bond funds for construction or operation of new Delta conveyance facilities. Public water agencies have committed to pay for construction of new Delta conveyance facilities under study as part of the Bay-Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP).

The historic legislative package on water specifies that the final BDCP must be consistent with the co-equal goals of improving water supply reliability and ecosystem health in the Delta.

#### Q: How would the bond measure benefit the environment?

A: The bond measure includes \$2.25 billion to restore the troubled Delta ecosystem, including investments to protect water quality and habitat. In addition, the bond measure includes \$1.79 billion in funding for coosystem and watershed protection elsewhere, including coastal protection, fish passage improvements, wildlife refuges and river restoration.

#### Q: How would the bond measure benefit the economy?

A: Infrastructure projects funded by the bond would create jobs and provide a muchneeded shot in the arm for the state's economy. Moreover, reinvesting in the state's water infrastructure is vital to ensuring a reliable water supply for business, industry and agriculture. Business leaders say that without these investments, California's economy will be hobbled by ongoing erosion of our water supply reliability.

## Q: Is the bond measure really about taking more water from Northern California and sending it to Southern California?

A: No. The bond measure at its core is about investing in the sustainability of our statewide water system so it can meet the co-equal goals of a reliable water supply and a healthy Delta ecosystem. It is also about investing in local resource development – including conservation, recycling, groundwater storage and other strategies – to increase local water supplies to meet the needs of our growing population.

## Q: How would be the general obligation bonds be issued and repaid?


A: The measure specifies that no more than \$5.57 billion in bonds may be issued before July 1, 2015, to ensure that the state's general fund can accommodate the debt repayment schedule. The state Treasurer's Office would issue the bonds, and the bonds would be repaid from the state's general fund.

## Q: What other funding would be leveraged if the bond is approved by voters?

A: The \$11.14 billion bond measure would leverage an additional \$30 billion in local and federal matching funds, for a total of \$40 billion in investments in the state's water system.

In addition, three specific projects in the region will receive funding:

- \$100 million for San Diego County water supply reliability projects
- \$8 million for Maywood (LA County) for water supply upgrades
- \$20 million for New River water quality and public health projects

Water Supply Reliability: The Los Angeles sub-region (Los Angeles and Ventura County watersheds) will receive \$198 million; the Santa Ana sub-region (Santa Ana River watershed and southern Orange County) will receive \$128 million; and the San Diego sub-region (watersheds of San Diego County) will receive \$87 million. The region is also eligible for a share of an additional \$350 million for local and regional conveyance projects.

Conservation and Watershed Protection Funds: The South Coast region is eligible for a share of the following conservation and watershed protection programs:

- \$150 million for ecosystem and watershed protection projects within coastal counties and watersheds. Additional funding for the region includes \$40 million for San Diego, including \$20 million for the San Diego River Conservancy; \$40 million for Santa Ana River Parkway; and \$20 million for Bolsa Chica Wetlands
- \$100 million for acquisition of water rights from willing sellers and conveyance of water to benefit migratory birds
- \$170 million for restoration and protection of wetlands, plus \$20 million specifically designated for habitat/public land linkages in Ventura County
- \$75 million to San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy

Water Recycling and Water Conservation: The South Coast region is eligible for a share of \$1.25 billion in funding, grants and loans for water recycling, desalination, groundwater recharge, urban and agriculture water use efficiency and conservation projects.

Payment of the settlement amount will officially close out LWD's contract with Jaynes for the Site Improvement Project.
