Minutes of a Regular Board Meeting May 19, 2010

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) was held Wednesday, May 19, 2010 at 5:00 p.m., at the District Administration Office at 1960 La Costa Ave., Carlsbad, California.

1. Call to Order

President Juliussen called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

2. Roll Call

President Juliussen stated that Ken Butts passed his 20th year anniversary of employment at LWD and is eligible for an incentive award of \$400. President Juliussen also provided background information about Ken and then presented Ken with an award certificate and a check.

Upon a motion duly made by Vice President Omsted, seconded by Director Sullivan, and carried, the Board of Directors approved the consent calendar.

8. Encina Wastewater Authority (EWA) Reports

A. Encina Wastewater Authority Report - April 28, 2010 Board Meeting.

Director Sullivan reported on EWA's April 28, 2010 Board Meeting.

GM Bushee reported on the MAM's May 12, 2010 meeting.

9. Committee Reports

A. Engineering Committee (EC) meeting was held on May 10, 2010.

Director Kulchin reported that the EC reviewed the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by RFYeager Engineering and agreed with staff to bring this item to the Board of Directors to receive and file the report.

Director Kulchin also reported that the EC reviewed the Final FY 2011 Capital Budgets. Director Kulchin noted that the EC had concern regarding the drought tolerant garden budget and requested to bring this item to the Board of Directors for discussion. This will be reviewed by the Board later in tonight's meeting.

FSM Schempp provided a summary of the Batiquitos Force Main (B2) Break and wastewater spill that occurred on May 3, 2010. In addition, PM Morishita provided an update on the Satellite Pump Stations, Force Mains, and Gravity Sewer Replacement Project.

B. Human Resources Committee (HRC) meeting was held on April 20, 2010.

Director Hanson stated that the HRC met in closed session to discuss the FY 2010 Informal Input Process regarding employee compensation. This item will be discussed in closed session at tonight's meeting.

10. Old Business

None.

11. New Business

A. Receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by Dexter Wilson Engineering and RFYeager Engineering (RFY).

PM Morishita presented the subject recommendation. PM Morishita stated that the EC reviewed this item at its May 10th meeting and agreed with staff to present to the Board of Directors for approval. PM Morishita discussed the purpose of the report, provided background information on the report, and indicated that the report was part of the FY 09 Tactical Plan. PM Morishita stated that Dexter Wilson Engineering oversaw the evaluation. He introduced Mr. Wilson, who provided an overview of the

RFY evaluation and recommendations of the report. Following Mr. Wilson's presentation, he answered the Board of Directors questions in regards to lining the sewer force mains as an alternative to adding cathodic protection. Mr. Wilson explained that RFY was able to learn more about the B2 force main after the sewer spill and lining the B2 would be an immediate solution to repair the force main. Mr. Wilson noted that the evaluation was completed prior to the spill; therefore some of the information included in the report is dated due to the additional information received, after viewing the level of corrosion on the force main in the area of the leak.

GM Bushee noted that staff is currently reviewing solutions to repair and/or replace a portion of the B2 Force Main and FSM Schempp will provide more detail when he presents information on the sewer spill.

President Juliussen requested that staff add an agenda item to the next EC agenda in regards to finding the best solution for repairing the force mains. GM Bushee agreed to do so.

GM Bushee recommended that the informational item on the status report on the B2 Force Main Repair be moved forward for discussion, since the discussion relates to the B2 Force Main.

President Juliussen moved item 12A. Status Report on the B2 Force Main Repair forward for discussion.

12. Informational Items (Moved Forward)

A. Status Report on the B2 Force Main Repair.

FSM Schempp presented a PowerPoint that included the following information on the May 3rd sewage spill:

- The chronology of events that occurred on May 3rd
- A GIS picture that showed the location of the spill
- Costs to contain the sewage by the pump trucks
- Photos of portions of the corroded Force Main

FSM Schempp noted that the cause of the spill was external corrosion due to the exposed metal pipe to the saltwater environment of the lagoon. Following the presentation, FSM Schempp answered the Board's questions relating to the cause of spill.

GM Bushee noted that RFY found parts of asphalt underneath the force main that tore through the plastic cover and exposed the pipe to the salt environment that accelerated the Force Main's external corrosion. He noted that the cost to clean up the spill and repair the broken force main was approximately \$44,000.

In addition, he noted that corrosion experts visually inspected the broken section of the force main that was removed and brought to LWD's Headquarters site. Based on the level of external and internal corrosion, the corrosion experts and District Engineer recommend lining approximately 3,400 feet of both force mains B2 and B3 in the

Batiquitos Lagoon area as soon as possible. The cost of this repair is estimated at \$800,000.

11. New Business (continued)

A. Receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by Dexter Wilson Engineering and RFYeager Engineering.

President Juliussen moved back to item 11A for the Board of Directors to receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by Dexter Wilson Engineering and RFYeager Engineering.

The Board of Directors unanimously voted to receive and file the Force Main External Corrosion Control Evaluation Report completed by RFYeager Engineering.

B. <u>Discussion Concerning the Construction of a Drought Tolerant Conservation Garden.</u>

PM Morishita presented the subject recommendation stating that during the discussion of the FY 2011 Budget at the EC meeting, staff included funds for the Drought Tolerant Conservation Garden located behind the block wall in the Northwest corner of the District's site. He noted that the garden site is potentially the future location of a pump station. The EC had concern with the cost of the garden and questioned whether the garden would be a prudent expenditure of LWD funds during this economic recession. At the EC's request, staff agreed to place this issue before the Board of Directors for discussion.

Director Sullivan stated that the timing for Drought Tolerant conservation garden is not right due to the economy.

Director Kulchin agreed with Director Sullivan stating that the expenditure would be excessive, especially considering that the garden would be located behind a wall where no one will see it. He noted there are other options that do not cost \$50,000.

Vice President Omsted stated that this is a good economic time to build a drought tolerant garden because LWD will be supplying work and stimulating the economy by spending the money, but he agreed with Director Kulchin that the location of garden was not ideal for spending a large amount of money.

GM Bushee noted that some funds will be included in the budget for gravel to be placed instead of a garden.

Following discussion, the Board directed staff to not pursue the garden at this time.

C. Overview of the Recommended Fiscal Year 2011 (FY 11) Budget.

ASM LeMay presented the subject recommendation. ASM LeMay presented a PowerPoint overview of the FY 11 Operating and Capital Budgets. Included in the presentation were the following:

Main objectives of the FY 11 Budget

• FY 11 Budget revenue projections included a wastewater service increase from

\$234.74 per year to \$258.21 per year

- Cost Allocation by Each Enterprise
 - Projected Wastewater, Batiquitos Pump Station, and Recycled Water Expenses
 - o Projected Administrative Services and Development Expenses
 - o Projected Capital Program Expenses

The Board discussed the FY 11 Budget. Following discussion, ASM LeMay stated that the FY 11 Budget will be presented for approval at the June 2010 meeting.

D. Update report on the Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 (Water Supply Act).

GM Bushee reviewed the subject item. GM Bushee stated that staff presented information about the Water Supply Act at the April 2010 Board meeting and this item was a follow up to the Board of Director's request for additional information. GM Bushee stated that he spoke with a representative from CASA and it is not taking a position on this legislation. He also reported that he spoke with GM Thorner of Olivenhain Municipal Water District (OMWD) and it has opted not to take a position on the Water Supply Act.

President Juliussen stated that he believes the District should take a neutral or no stand position on this legislation. Vice President Omsted agreed with President Juliussen; in addition, Vice President Omsted suggested removing the article in the newsletter that discussed the water act. Following discussion, the Board of Directors opted not to take a position on the Water Supply Act.

12, Information Items

B. Site Improvement Project - Settlement of Potential Claim with Jaynes Corporation.

GM Bushee stated that LWD and Jaynes Corporation have resolved a potential claim and LWD has agreed to pay \$37,500 to settle the dispute. GM Bushee added that the settlement amount was within the Board of Director's authorization of \$40,000.

13. Directors' Meetings

A. CWEA Annual Conference was held at the Sacramento Convention Center on April 20-23, 2010.

Directors Omsted and Sullivan stated that they attended the CWEA Conference. Director Sullivan reported that staff represented the District well, and she would like to see more staff members attend this conference.

Vice President Omsted reported on the sessions that he attended.

C. CSDA Legislative Days Conference was held at the Sheraton Grand Hotel in Sacramento, CA on May 11-12, 2010.

Director Sullivan reported that she attended the conference and met with Senator Wyland's representatives to discuss special district issues.

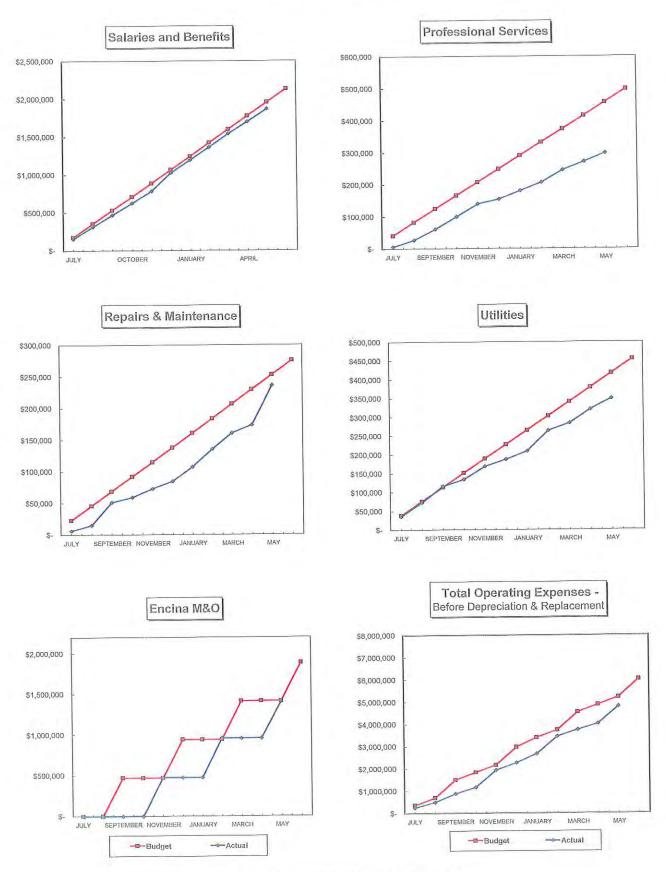
Leucadia Wastewater District Revenue FY 2010

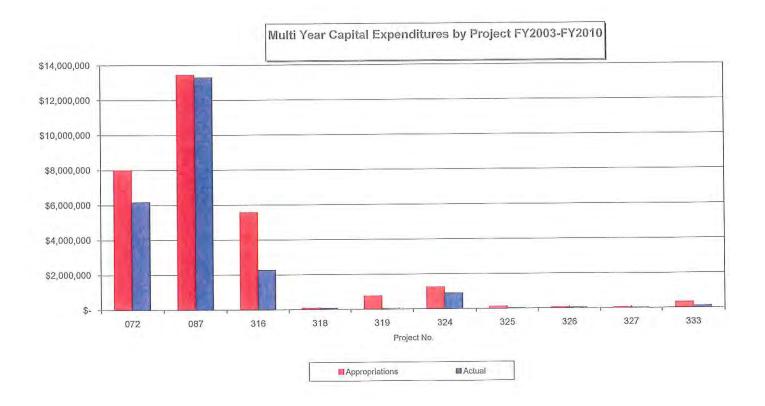
Leucadia Wastewater District Operating Expenses FY 2010 YTD through May 31, 2010

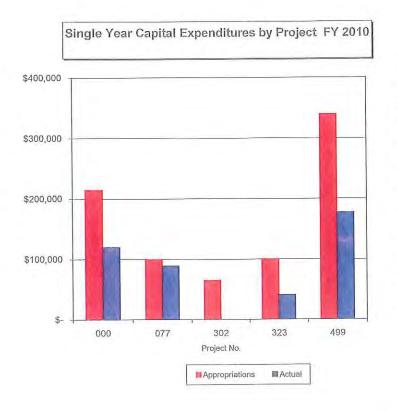

As of May 31, 2010



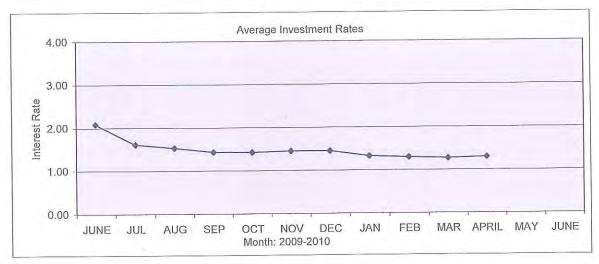


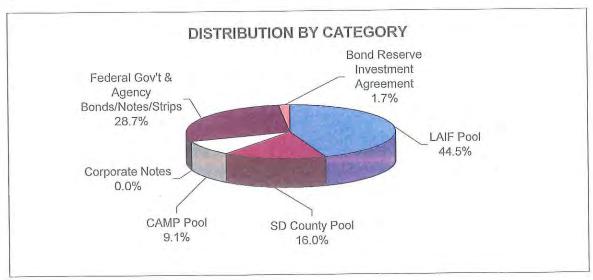

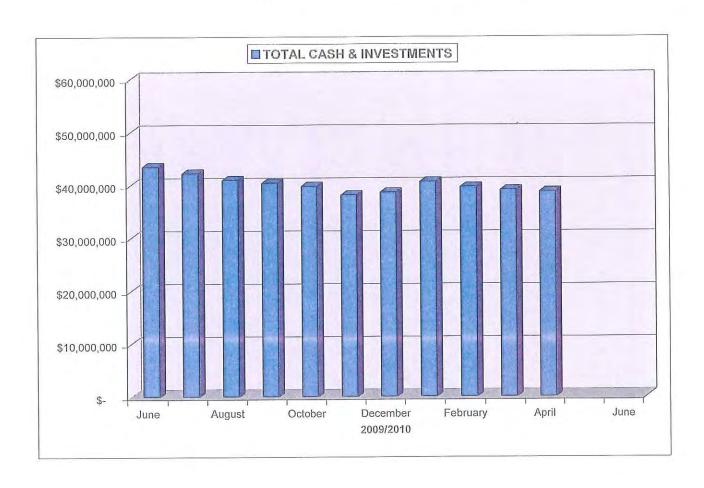

Brownell & Duffey, Certified Public Accountants (B&D) has been providing accounting and financial services for the Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) since 2000. Their current agreement, which began July 1, 2008, expires on June 30, 2010. This agenda item requests authorization for the General Manager to execute a professional services agreement with B&D for the period July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2012.

B&D's service to LWD over the past ten years has been excellent. Mr. Richard Duffey, one of B&D's principals, has an excellent working knowledge of LWD and the Encina Wastewater Authority. In particular, he has been instrumental in ensuring the high quality of LWD's general accounting and financial functions including preparation for the annual audits.

The attached Scope of Work details specific tasks to be accomplished. These tasks include: reconciling LWD's expenses and revenues; preparing financial records for the year-end audit; assistance with the preparation of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR); and, providing executive level financial advice and support to LWD staff. Additional monthly, quarterly, and year-end tasks are also included.

The proposed annual fee for B&D services is \$99,900 per year for a total of \$199,800 over the two-year agreement period. Sufficient funds to cover B&D services for Fiscal Year 2011 are included in the recommended annual budget.

This agenda item requests authorization for the General Manager to execute a professional services agreement with Dudek for the period July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2012.

Dudek has provided LWD's District Engineering services since 1996. Through their experience at LWD, they have gained a unique working knowledge of the District and the technical components of our collection system. For this reason, staff is recommending that Dudek continue to provide engineering consulting services.

The attached Scope of Work details specific tasks to be accomplished. These tasks include services that support our District Engineering and Capital Improvement Program.

The proposed annual fee for Dudek services is \$120,000 per year for a total of \$240,000 over the two-year agreement period. Sufficient funds to cover these services for Fiscal Year 2011 are included in the recommended annual budget.

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the General Manager to execute a twoyear professional services agreement with Dudek & Associates.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

Dudek, Inc. (Consultant) shall provide the following services, which are necessary to continue District Engineering (DE) and Capital Improvement Program Management (CIPM) Consulting Services. General descriptions of the respective consulting services to be provided at the discretion of the District are as follows:

1. District Engineering

- Provide general Professional Engineering guidance to the District staff and Board of Directors;
- Attend Board Meetings and Engineering Committee Meetings;
- Interface with District Legal Counsel and other District consultants;
- Represent the District in meetings and matters relating to land development, District planning, interagency relations, and other District matters;
- Interface with the general public and District customers;
- Interpret the District's standard specifications and policies as related to engineering issues;
- Complete specific miscellaneous requested and mutually agreed DE related tasks.

2. Capital Improvement Program Management

- Attend Board Meetings and Engineering Committee Meetings, as requested;
- Assist with technical review of CIP projects;
- Attend CIP project review and scheduling meetings providing minutes and distribution as required;
- Attend contractor pre-bid meetings and bid openings, as requested by the District;
- Provide contractor construction bid evaluations;
- Assist District with preparation, distribution and advertisement of District RFP's;
- Assist the District with long range planning and implementation of the Wastewater CIP;
- Assist with preliminary identification and direction of permitting activities for CIP projects;
- Assist with financial matters such as grant requests, loan documents, bonds, letters of credit and credit/rebates for energy saving projects;
- Assist with CIP project scheduling as requested by District; and
- Complete specifically requested and mutually agreed upon CIPM related tasks.

The DE and CIPM services shall be billed and tracked on a time and materials basis with initial estimated limits of \$60,000 for each component. The DE and CIPM budgets augment each other, only as necessary, and to the extent that the total initial annual fee authorization of \$120,000 is not exceeded without further District authorization.

The hourly billing rate for Steve Deering and Michael Metts will be \$205 each. Support staff will be billed in accordance with the Dudek current Standard of Charges (attached). Expended-to-date and projected fees will be reviewed by Consultant with the District on a monthly basis at the time of invoicing. Consultant may request consideration by the District for additional fee authorization during the agreement period based on mutually anticipated and agreed need.

In February 2007, the Board of Directors awarded an agreement for Construction Management (CM) Services for the District's Site Improvement Project to Dudek in the amount of \$998,138. As you may recall, the Scope of Work for the services to be provided included:

General Project Management and Coordination

- 2. Construction Document Review including constructability review and construction contractor pre-qualification
- 3. Construction Management
- 4. Construction Inspection Services

In October 2009, the Board authorized the execution of Amendment No. 1 to the Dudek agreement in an amount not to exceed \$83,996 raising the total contract amount to \$1,082,134. The actual substantial completion date of construction was November 3, 2009 instead of the projected completion date of October 28, 2009. Subsequently, contract closeout; including correcting punch list items, settling claims and change orders, and warranty documentation; was not completed until January 2010. Dudek continued to provide CM Services until contract closeout was complete. Additionally, Dudek provided CM services during the installation of the Photovoltaic (PV) System. In providing this continued service, Dudek exceeded the approved budget by more than \$160,000. Overall, the Dudek team provided excellent CM and inspection services throughout the project.

Staff recently met with Dudek to discuss these issues. As a result of these meetings, staff has negotiated a price of \$120,000, which staff believes to be fair and reasonable. Attached please find Dudek's request for the contract amendment for your review. Mr. George Litzinger of Dudek will be on-hand at the upcoming meeting to respond to any questions the Board may have.

Based on this information, staff is recommending that the Dudek Construction Management Services agreement be amended in an amount not to exceed \$120,000, which will bring the total not to exceed amount for the contract to \$1,202,134.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is sufficient funding in the Site Improvement Account of the Capital Budget to cover the additional cost of this contract amendment.

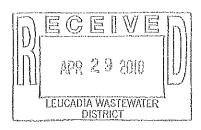

Attached, please find the following three documents:

Invoice #20100954 for \$30,142.00. This invoice covers the remaining amount available in the current PO that was increased by Amendment No.1. We made a separate invoice so it could be processed while the District reviewed our change order request.

Contract Amendment Authorization in the amount of \$120,000. As discussed, the construction contract duration for the project exceeded the approved completion date of October 18, 2009. However, it wasn't until early 2010 by the time all of the closeout documents, claims and punchlist work were completed by Jaynes Corporation. Consequently, Dudek continued to provide CM and inspection services through out this time until all of the work was completed.

In doing so, unfortunately Dudek significantly exceeded the approved budget by more than \$160,000, without receiving prior approval from the District. In negotiations with the District, Dudek agreed to reduce this amount to \$120,000, and we appreciate the District for this. Therefore, Dudek is requesting an Amendment (No. 02) to its current contract for \$120,000.

Invoice #20100955 for \$119,998.50. If the District approves our request for an Amendment, this invoice covers the amount of Amendment No.2, except for \$1.50.

This will closeout the project as far as Dudek is concerned, and Dudek wants to thank the District for the opportunity to provide CM and inspection services on this project. It's a great project that we are very proud of, and look forward to working with the District in the future.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff requests that the Board of Directors:

1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a three year professional services agreement with ADS Corporation (ADS) for the maintenance of and analysis of data from seven (7) permanently installed flow meters in an amount not to exceed \$42,840 per year for a total of \$128,520 over a three year period.

2. Discuss and take other action as appropriate.

DISCUSSION:

In October 2007, the Board of Directors approved a contract with ADS for the installation of seven permanent flow meters in the District's collection system. Seven meters were installed at the following locations:

Meter No.	<u>Location</u>
L1	Highway 101
L2	Olivenhain Road
L3	South Green Valley
L4	La Costa Avenue
L5	North Green Valley
L6	Saxony Pump Station (Clamp-on flow meter)
L7	La Costa Pump Station (Clamp-on flow meter)

In July of 2008 and, again in July of 2009, the District executed one-year agreements with ADS for equipment maintenance, data collection, analysis, and reporting services at an annual cost of \$47,930. Recently, staff met with ADS Corporation to negotiate the continuance of these services. As a result, staff is recommending a three–year contract for FY's 2011, 2012, and 2013. The annual cost of these same services is \$42,840 for a total 3 year cost of \$128,520. This represents an annual cost savings of \$5,090 per year (total savings of \$15,270). The attached scope of work is provided for your review.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Sufficient funds have been appropriated in the FY 11 Operating Budget to cover the costs associated with this agreement.

ATTACHMENT A

SCOPE OF WORK

ADS will operate a flow meter network of seven (7) meters for the Leucadia Water District ("District"). The work will be performed as set forth below:

- I. Comprehensive Service ADS will provide services to maintain and operate the flow metering equipment (July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2013).
 - 1) <u>Diagnostics</u>: Remote diagnostic inspection of all equipment using the most current procedures and programs from its facilities in San Diego, CA or other service locations.
 - 2) Repair: Repair and preventative maintenance services, including battery replacement (assuming a 15-minute sample rate), necessary to keep the equipment operating in accordance with the manufacturer's design specifications. ADS will respond to a malfunction within two (2) business days and perform repairs or temporary repairs within (2) business days thereafter. The types of conditions to be repaired and repair services to be performed under this Agreement include but are not limited to the following:
 - Communication link failure including control boards, modem, and modem interface;
 - Depth sensor replacement A depth sensor shall be considered for replacement if the sensor has less than four (4) good sensor pair firing in both directions;
 - Low battery voltages Battery voltages shall be considered as being low when the voltage is less than 9.5V;
 - Velocity sensor replacement A velocity sensor shall be considered for replacement if the sensor readings are a constant value or zero, indicating a loss of sensitivity;
 - Sensor scrubbing;
 - Pressure sensor replacement; and
 - Level sensor replacement.
 - 3) <u>Hydraulic Confirmations:</u> ADS will perform annual field confirmations according to ADS's current internal quality procedures for all of the ADS FlowShark flow monitors including:
 - Verification of the depth of flow measurement
 - Verification of the velocity measurement
 - Manual field flow to monitor flow comparison
 - Pipe condition assessment
 - Statement of confirmation

- 4) <u>Service Schedule:</u> The field service shall occur during the normal operating hours of 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday (excluding holidays).
- 5) <u>Service Statement:</u> ADS shall prepare a statement of repair service whenever service or diagnostic functions are performed. These forms shall be submitted to the District each month as an attachment to the monthly invoice.
- 6) <u>Primary Contact:</u> ADS shall designate a field service representative who shall be the primary contact with the District for the resolution of field problems.

II. Data Analysis, Alarming, and Reporting Services (July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2013)

Data services will be conducted from our National Data Center where trained Data Analysts utilize IntelliServe™ and Profile® software, as well as Six Sigma quality assurance procedures to maximize data usability and ensure data up-time.

- 1) Data Collection and Diagnosis: Raw data will be uploaded from the flow meters every twenty-four (24) hours to the IntelliServe™ web hosted system. ADS data analysts will review the data (e.g. bi-weekly) to verify that equipment is in working order and will dispatch ADS field crews to perform equipment repair or hydraulic confirmations as needed.
- 2) <u>Data Editing and Analysis:</u> A trained ADS data analyst will use ADS Profile® software to directly calculate flow using the continuity equation from recorded depth and average velocity data. Flow quantities as determined by the continuity equation will be plotted. The analyst will also utilize scatter plots (depth vs. velocity readings) and field hydraulic confirmation both to verify monitor accuracy.
- 3) <u>Data Reporting:</u> The Final flow data will be reported to the District on a monthly basis via our IntelliServe™ web hosting system, no later than thirty (30) days after the end of the monthly monitoring period, and will include the following.
 - Key manhole identification, pipe diameter, pipe shape, and silt levels.
 - Days of the week constituting the long table, up to seven (7) days.
 - Depth of flow in fifteen (15) minute intervals from 0:00 to 23:45
 - Average Velocity in fifteen (15) minute increments in feet per second (fps).
 - Flows calculated in fifteen (15) minute increments in millions of gallons per day (mgd).
 - Minimum and maximum flows with time of occurrence measured daily in millions of gallons per day (mgd).
 - Average weekly flow measured in millions of gallons per day (mgd).
 - Daily and weekly flow totals in millions of gallons
 - Data provided in hardcopy and electronic format
- 4) <u>Data Alarming:</u> The IntelliServe™ web hosting system will send out real-time alarms (via the web, pagers, cell phones, emails) if any set triggers are reached at the individual flow meters. Alarm triggers can be set for High Depth and Low Flow.

III. Exclusions

The types of services excluded under this comprehensive service agreement include the following:

- Civil Engineer's Stamp on any plans for submitted for permitting;
- Work conducted outside of Service Schedule;
- Changes or alterations in specifications;
- Painting or refinishing or furnishing materials therefore except as damaged by ADS during service work;
- Installation, moving, or removing of equipment unless required as part of the repair process;
- Repairs made necessary due to the negligence of the District, its employees, agents, invitees, or contractors;
- Repairs made necessary due to attempts by District to repair or maintain the equipment unless authorized by ADS
- Maintenance and repair necessary to put equipment not under the comprehensive scheduled service contract in good repair;
- Equipment repair or replacement outside manufacturer's design specifications when knowingly directed by District; and
- Repairs made necessary due to events beyond ADS's control (force majeure).

IV. District Responsibilities

- 1) Access to the site of work with sufficient area for placement of personnel and equipment, including all right-of-way and ramps, if required. This includes, but is not limited to, exposing manholes, clearing easements and/or constructing roads or ramps suitable for truck/van, if necessary.
- 2) Pay all local licenses and permits fees, if required;
- 3) Assist in obtaining and complying with any special permits;
- 4) Ensure that selected sites have been jet cleaned to minimize hydraulic deficiencies; and
- 5) Provide any information concerning bypasses, overflows, base flows, critical surcharge areas, and maintenance habits

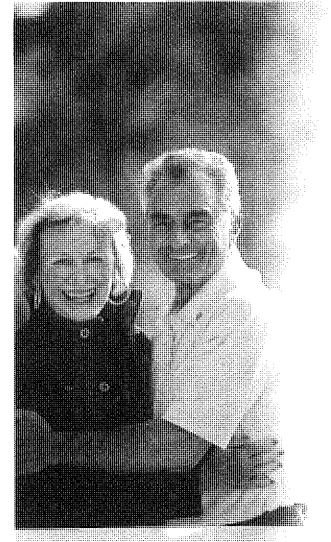

Leading the Way: David Kulchin Begins Term as Community Advisory Board Chairman

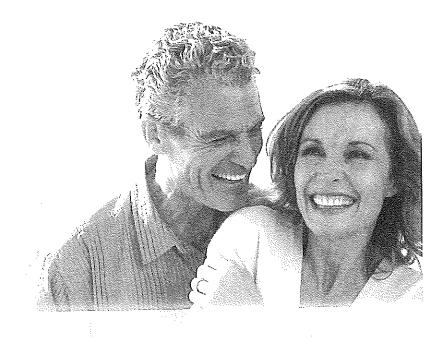

General Manager of the Year

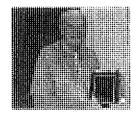

Excellence in Community Service

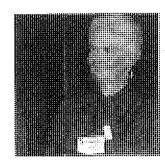

The criteria for this award includes a demonstration of an increase in the district's visibility with the public or the Legislature, an improvement in district-constituent communication, and evidence of communication pieces that are visually/graphically appealing and that include thorough and appropriate content relevant to district business. This award will be presented on Wednesday, September 22 at the Awards Banquet.

How to Enter (Application for CSDA Awards)

The District must be a CSDA Member in good standing and must submit the following information by August 6, 2010 at 5:00 p.m. An external non-biased public relations firm will be reviewing all submissions and selecting the winners.

- 1. Submit a cover letter including: district name, address, contact, email, authorized signature, whether you are a small district (budget up to \$1,000,000) or a large district (budget greater than \$1,000,000) and the award for which you would like to be considered.
- 2. Submit copies of all applicable documentation (i.e., a brochure on the program, a letter of commendation to an individual, etc.) with an explanation of why you believe your program/individual should be considered.

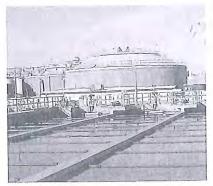

Join Us for a Special Private Tour of the Orange County Sanitation District & Ground Water Replenishment System Facilities

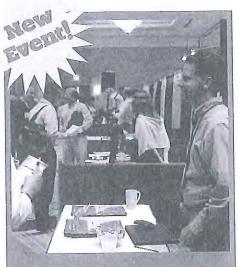
Monday, September 20 from 1:30 – 4:30 p.m.

The Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD) is the third largest wastewater treatment facility west of the Mississippi river and handles more than 200 million gallons a day. The plant treats, recycles or safely disposes wastewater for the 2.5 million residents of North and Central Orange County. Currently, OCSD is at the tail end of a half-billion dollar capital improvement program to bring treatment levels up to full secondary levels. You'll see the treatment process from raw sewage to advanced secondary treatment.

Once safely treated, the wastewater heads up to OCSD's partner, the Orange County Water District, for advanced purification through the Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS). About 70 million gallons per day flow through the largest water recycling project in the world through an advanced three-step process that turns treated wastewater into near distilled quality drinking water.

Come see the project that has won numerous awards and is the future for California's water supply. The tour will take you from start to finish: seeing, smelling and even drinking the water. You'll see raw sewage turned into clean, purified water that is put back into Orange County's water table.

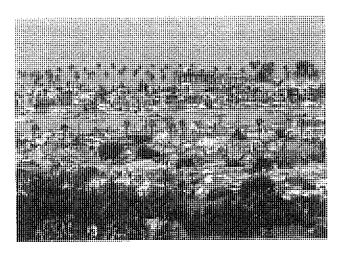

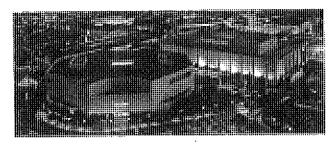
