He added that this Resolution is the District's first Resolution that will reinforce employees' salaries and benefits. In addition, he stated that as a result of the CalPERS audit, they required that the District adopt a resolution explaining all employees' salaries and benefits.

He noted that the salaries and benefits described in the resolution were presented to the Board at their May 6, 2014 Special Board meeting.

He also summarized the following key items in the Resolution:

- No cost of living adjustment was authorized;
- There was a 1.5% range adjustment in the salary ranges;
- Revised language from the HRPM regarding the sick leave buy-back was included; and
- CalPERS requirement to include uniform allowance language for classic employees.

#### 21. Project Status Updates and Other Informational Reports

A. <u>Gravity Pipeline Rehabilitation Project – Project Completion.</u>

TSM Morishita reported that the Gravity Pipeline Rehabilitation Project was completed on May 28, 2014 and provided a brief summary of the completed work. He stated that final project cost was \$403,344.93, which included two change orders totaling \$26,653.93 or 7% of the original contract amount. He noted that staff filed the Notice of Completion with the County of San Diego on June 3, 2014.

Director Omsted asked if this project would be a yearly process. TSM Morishita replied yes and that staff has developed a process to annually prioritize the replacement of gravity lines and manholes as part of the Asset Management Plan Implementation.

## B. LWD 2014 Employee Luncheon is schedule for Thursday, July 10, 2014.

EA Hill announced the date and location of 2014 Employee Luncheon.

C. <u>Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce State of the City Luncheon is scheduled for Friday, August</u> 22, 2014 from 11AM to 1:30PM at the Sheraton Carlsbad Resort & Spa.

President Kulchin stated that the State of the City Luncheon conflicts with the CASA's Annual Conference.

D. Letter to Legislators regarding support funding for the recycled water programs in the water bond.

EA Hill stated that at the request of the North San Diego County Recycled Water Group, staff prepared and sent the letter enclosed in the agenda to legislatures requesting that \$1 billion of the water bond be dedicated to recycled water grant programs.

Director Juliussen suggested that the LWD Board President sign letters to legislatures. ASM LeMay indicated that GM Bushee signed the letters due to the short time constraint. He added that staff will inform GM Bushee on his request.

#### 22. Directors' Meetings and Conference Reports

A. <u>The 2014 CSDA Legislative Days Conference was held at the Sacramento Convention</u> Center on May 19-21, 2014 in Sacramento, CA.

Director Sullivan reported that she attended both the CSDA and CASA Legislation conferences. She stated that CASA's conference was more organized than CSDA's conference. She also noted that the legislatures asked for local politicians to invite them to their award ceremonies or other important events. She added that they would like for local politicians to contact them and keep them informed on local issues.

Director Hanson commented on the panel sessions that she attended.

#### 23. General Manager's Report

- TSM Morishita reported President Obama signed the Water Resources Reform and Development Act (WRRDA) of 2014 yesterday. He stated that this is another resource that the San Diego County Recycled Water Group can apply for federal funding.

The IFC and staff reviewed and discussed the current policy. The following issues were addressed:

GM Bushee stated that staff will forward IFC's recommendations and requests to the Board of Directors for discussion and/or approval.

A meeting of the Engineering Committee (EC) of Leucadia Wastewater District (LWD) was held on Wednesday, July 2 at 8:30 a.m., at the LWD Administration Office located at 1960 La Costa Avenue, Carlsbad, California.

#### 1. Call to Order

Chairperson Juliussen called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

#### 2. Roll Call

#### 5. New Business

A. <u>Authorize the General Manager to execute an agreement with Infrastructure</u> <u>Engineering Corporation for engineering design services for the Fiscal Year 2015</u> <u>Gravity Pipeline Rehabilitation Project in an amount not to exceed \$48,841.</u>

TSM Morishita presented staff's recommendation. He stated that the shift in Field Service focus from hydro-cleaning to Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) Inspection has resulted in the discovery of significant pipe defects throughout the collection system that are of a high priority for repair. TSM Morishita said that staff has developed and maintains a prioritized list of pipelines with defects called the Repair Priority List. He said that the Gravity Pipeline Rehabilitation Project (Project) for Fiscal Year 2015 will focus on the repair of the prioritized collection system defects on the Repair Priority List.

TSM Morishita said Infrastructure Engineering Corporation (IEC) has submitted a proposal to complete the design phase of the Project for \$48,841. He indicated that staff reviewed the proposal and has determined that it is fair and reasonable.

After discussion, the EC concurred with staff to recommend this item to the Board for approval at the July 2014 Board meeting.

B. Adoption of the Batiquitos (B2) Force Main Mitigated Negative Declaration and Mitigation, Monitoring and Reporting Plan and authorize Staff to proceed with project alignment Option C, using the abandoned portion of southbound Carlsbad Boulevard, for the installation of the replacement B2 Force Main.

TSM Morishita presented background on the requirement for a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan (MMRP) for the B2 Force Main Replacement Project (Project). He presented the three alignment options; A, B and C; considered in the MND TSM Morishita said that the District has reached consensus with City of Carlsbad and the California Department of Parks and Recreation to construct alignment Option C. He stated that Option C is the preferred alignment because it avoids the environmentally sensitive areas, relocates B2 away from residential development and the Hilton and reduces traffic control requirements and associated restrictive construction periods due to construction in the abandoned section of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard.

TSM Morishita explained that the CEQA process for adoption of a MND includes a 30 day public comment period. He said that this period commenced on May 27, 2014 and concluded on June 25, 2014. He indicated that written comments on the MND were received from Carlsbad, California Department of Parks and Recreation, California Coastal Commission and California Department of Fish and Wildlife. TSM Morishita explained that implementing both Option C for the B2 alignment and the Mitigation, Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) developed for the project will mitigate the concerns raised in the written comments.

After discussion, the EC concurred with staff to recommend the MND and MMRP to the Board for adoption at the July 2014 Board meeting and authorize staff to proceed with alignment Option C.

## 6. Information Items

#### A. Potential Amendment to the Wave Crest (Hilton) Agreement

TSM Morishita presented this item to the committee. He said the anticipated Board approval of the Option C alignment will relocate B1 and B2 into the same alignment west, across of Highway 101, from the Hilton. TSM Morishita stated that GM Bushee contacted Mr. Canepa with Wave Crest to inform him of the modified force main alignment. Mr. Canepa asked if the relocation of B3 in front of the Hilton is still required. GM Bushee explained to Mr. Canepa that the relocation of B3 was being done only as a result of the Wave Crest Funding Agreement. It is not out of operational necessity for the District. Mr. Canepa stated that, if Option C is approved, he would prefer that B3 not be realigned at this time. Mr. Canepa said that Wave Crest will still provide the agreed to \$220,000 Project funding.

GM Bushee recommended that, to honor the intent of the original agreement, an amendment to the original agreement should be executed. The amendment would state that when the B3 Force Main requires replacement, it would be relocated into the north bound lanes of Highway 101 away from the Hilton property. Mr. Canepa agreed with this approach.

After discussion, the EC concurred with staff to present the amendment to the Board for approval at the July 2014 Board meeting.

# B. Leucadia Generator Replacement Project Status

TSM Morishita reported that NEWest has answered all questions regarding the proposal to install a 440 gallon auxiliary tank. He stated that IEC has reviewed the submittal and takes no exception to the NEWest proposal. TSM Morishita said that a response letter accepting the concept of installing the auxiliary tank has been sent. He said that NEWest has requested payment of their last invoice of \$195,987.45. TSM Morishita stated that, as a show of good faith, the District will pay \$95,987.45 after the satisfactory completion of the pre-construction meeting. He stated that this will leave \$100,000 plus the retention amount of approximately \$23,800 to cover any contingencies.

# C. Recycled Water Effluent Line & Creek Crossing Repair Project Status

TSM Morishita reported that the project went out for bids on June 16, 2014. He said that a Pre-Bid Conference was held on June 26<sup>th</sup>. TSM Morishita stated that only one contractor attended the conference. However, there are currently 11 companies on the plan holders list. He said that bids are due on July 17<sup>th</sup>.

# 7. Director's Comments

Chairman Juliussen asked about the future Interstate 5 (I-5) expansion project and its effect on the cleaning of the collection system in the area. GM Bushee answered that DE Deering has provided comments to Caltrans and is tracking the expansion project to ensure that District's assets are protected and taken care of. FSS Gonzalez stated that once staff purchases the mini-jetter, budgeted for this fiscal year, it will make cleaning the line easier because the mini-jetter has a smaller hose and smaller foot print than a Vactor truck.

## 8. General Manager's Comments

GM Bushee mentioned that he will be requesting a meeting with the Board to discuss the Encina South Parcel. Additionally, FSSupt Stecker mentioned that the District completed Fiscal Year 2014 with no collection system spills.

## 9. Adjournment

Chairperson Juliussen adjourned the meeting at approximately 9:15 a.m.


# Leucadia Wastewater District Revenue FY 2014

YTD through June 30, 2014






### Leucadia Wastewater District Operating Expenses FY 2014 YTD through June 30, 2014



#### Leucadia Wastewater District Capital Expenditures As of June 30, 2014












# Notice of Intent to Adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration

## **Purpose of this Notice**

This notice announces the availability of environmental documentation for public review, relative to the **Leucadia Wastewater District's proposed B2 Force Main Replacement Project**. The District has completed an Initial Study consistent with requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the state's *CEQA Guidelines*, and has concluded that with the environmental measures included in the Project and the incorporation of mitigation identified through the CEQA process, the B2 Force Main Replacement Project would not have significant adverse impacts on the environment. The District accordingly proposes to file a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the project.

## **Project Location and Description**


The B2 Force Main Replacement Project (Project) would replace and realign existing sanitary sewer and treated wastewater pipelines along an approximately 1.5-mile-long alignment near South Carlsbad State Beach. Project goals include replacing a critical wastewater conveyance facility that has experienced past failures; maintaining the redundancy of the District's wastewater conveyance to the Encina Water Pollution Control Facility; bringing older facilities up to current design standards; reducing the potential for future failure, major pipeline repairs, and service shut-downs; and improving coordination with City of Carlsbad land use planning. In addition, by reducing the risk of failure, the Project would improve protection of the coastal environment.

The B2 force main is an important 24-inch-diameter pipeline, currently on standby status after repairs following failures in 2010 and 2013. As a result of the 2010 failure, 1,475 feet of the original ductile iron B2 force main was replaced with polyvinyl chloride (PVC) in 2011. The District is replacing the remainder of the pipeline after the second failure on a different section of the line in 2013. The District uses PVC instead of ductile iron when replacing its force mains because of PVC's improved resistance to corrosion and longer lifespan. This project also provides an opportunity to realign portions of the B1, B2, and B3 force mains to better accommodate existing and future development in this portion of the City of Carlsbad.

The District is considering three Options for the B2 force main replacement, shown on the back of this Notice.

 Option A – The Option A alignment follows northbound Carlsbad Boulevard to a point approximately 400 feet north of Avenida Encinas, then crosses via the former Ponto Drive offramp alignment to Ponto Drive, continuing north to the end of Ponto Drive. There, it shifts west into the northbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard and at the Ponto Road intersection continues north on the eastern edge of Carlsbad Boulevard to Breakwater Road. Option A then continues north in the frontage road between Carlsbad Boulevard and the Lanikai Mobile Home Park (Lanikai) and ends at the northwest corner of Lanikai. This Option would largely follow the existing B2 force main alignment (replace-inplace installation)

- **Option B** This Option would realign a portion of the B2 force main into the eastern edge of the southbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard from Avenida Encinas to the intersection of Carlsbad Boulevard and Ponto Road
- Option C This Option would realign a portion of the B2 force main into the disused former southbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard (along the eastern edge of the South Carlsbad State Beach campground) from Avenida Encinas as far north as Breakwater Road, where it crosses back east into Ponto Drive

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff and the Engineering committee recommend that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Adopt the Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) and the Mitigation, Monitoring and Reporting Plan (MMRP) for the Batiquitos (B2) Force Main Replacement Project; and
- 2. Authorize Staff to proceed with project alignment Option C, using the abandoned portion of southbound Carlsbad Boulevard, for the installation of the replacement B2 Force Main.
- 3. Discuss and take other action as appropriate.

#### DISCUSSION:

This item was reviewed by the EC at its July 2, 2014 meeting and the EC concurred with staff to recommend this item for Board approval.

In February 2014 the Board of Directors (Board) received and filed the B2 Force Main Preliminary Design Report completed by Infrastructure Engineering Corporation (IEC). Additionally, the Board authorized the execution of an agreement with Wave Crest Oceanfront, LLC (Wave Crest) pertaining to the realignment of the three District force mains (B1, B2, and B3) into the north bound lanes of Highway 101 in front of the Hilton Carlsbad Resort & Spa (Hilton) as part of the B2 Force Main Replacement Project.

To construct this realignment, the three force mains will be placed in previously undisturbed soil under Highway 101. As a result, the project is required to satisfy California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) standards. Meeting these standards requires an environmental impact assessment of the entire project alignment. IEC was tasked to conduct the assessment. During the assessment, Coastal Sage Scrub (California Gnatcatcher habitat) was discovered over the current B2 alignment in the vacant area (Ponto Area) bordered by Ponto Drive on the north and east, Carlsbad Boulevard (Highway 101) on the west and Avenida Encinas on the south, establishing the Ponto Area as environmentally sensitive. It should be noted that the area previously contained the Ponto Drive off ramp from north bound Highway 101. The ramp was demolished and the area was re-vegetated with Coastal Sage Scrub. However, the City of Carlsbad (Carlsbad) still owns the right-of-way through the area in which B2 is located. The assessment resulted in the completion of an Initial Study (IS) and development of a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) by IEC, enclosed.

With the Ponto Area designated as environmentally sensitive, the design team considered relocating B2 adjacent to the south bound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard north of Avenida Encinas to prevent disturbance of the Ponto Area. Avoiding the Ponto Area would remove the

required mitigation measures of re-vegetation of the construction zone, the purchase of a mitigation land bank and construction restrictions due to the Gnatcatcher nesting season. As a result, the MND was developed to include three B2 alignment options as follows:

- 1. Option A Dig and replace B2 in its current alignment except for the 800 feet in front of the Hilton which would be relocated into north bound Carlsbad Boulevard. (Figure 1a)
- Option B Realign B2 into the east shoulder of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard from north of Avenida Encinas to Ponto Road. The remaining B2 sections will be replaced in the current alignment. (Figure 1b)
- Option C Realign B2 into the west shoulder of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard from north of Avenida Encinas to Ponto Road and continue north in the abandoned section of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard to Breakwater Road. The remaining B2 sections will be replaced in the current alignment. (Figure 1c)

Including the three alignment options in the MND enabled the CEQA process to advance while staff worked with Carlsbad and the California Department of Parks and Recreation (State Parks) to reach consensus on Options B and C. Option C is the preferred alignment for the following reasons:

- > Avoids the environmentally sensitive Ponto Area
- Relocates B2 away from residential development and the Hilton
- Reduces traffic control requirements and associated restrictive construction periods due to construction in the abandoned section of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard

The CEQA process for adoption of a MND includes a 30 day public comment period. This period commenced on May 27, 2014 and concluded on June 25, 2014. Having previously obtained Carlsbad concurrence on Option C, on June 8<sup>th</sup> staff received State Parks' concurrence, establishing Option C as the project alignment. Subsequently, written comments on the IS-MND were received from Carlsbad, State Parks, California Coastal Commission and California Department of Fish and Wildlife, attached for you review. Implementing Option C for the B2 alignment and the Mitigation, Monitoring and Reporting Plan (MMRP), attached, developed for the project will mitigate the concerns raised in the written comments.

In summary, the majority of impacts identified in the MND are construction related and can be mitigated through the use of best management practices and compliance with the MMRP. Overall, the MND states that no long-term significant impacts will result from the B2 Replacement Project. Therefore, Staff recommends that the Board adopt the draft MND and MMRP for the project and authorize Staff to proceed with project alignment Option C, using the abandoned portion of southbound Carlsbad Boulevard, for the installation of the replacement B2 Force Main.

Additionally, the Secondary Effluent (B1) Force Main between the Encina Water Pollution Control Facility and the Gafner Advanced Water Treatment Plant was installed circa 1970 and will require eventual replacement to enable the District to continue production of recycled water. The replacement of the B2 Force Main presents a unique opportunity to simultaneously replace the section of B1 in Carlsbad Boulevard. B1 can be placed in the same trench as B2, significantly reducing the construction costs of replacing B1 as a separate project. Therefore, the replacement of B1 will be incorporated into the B2 Replacement Project.



Thank you for the opportunity to review the Draft Initial Study for the B2 Force Main Replacement project. Although the Leucadia Wastewater District ("District") has stated their preference would be for Option C, realigning a portion of the B2 force main into the disused former southbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard, three Options are analyzed in the Draft Initial Study. Therefore, the comments and concerns stated below are based on analysis of Option A, B and C alignments.

#### Planning:

Description of Project - Construction Schedule and Hours

- 1. The construction schedule states that the project completion date is anticipated to be in February/March 2015. However, the Biological Resources section states that construction is planned to occur entirely outside of the bird nesting season (February 1 – September 15). Please change the construction schedule to be consistent with the Biological Resources section; otherwise, additional mitigation and potentially recirculation would be necessary.
- 2. Since the Option A alignment requires the wildlife agencies' approval of a restoration management and monitoring plan, these agencies should also be identified.

**Environmental Factors Potentially Affected** 

3. The Option A alignment would have impacts to sensitive habitat, therefore, Biological Resources and Mandatory Findings of Significance should be checked.



**Biological Resources** 

- 4. Under the Option A alignment, please include as a mitigation measure a five (5) year restoration management and monitoring plan for all areas where sensitive habitat would be removed and revegetated per the city's Guidelines for Habitat Creation and Restoration, dated July 20, 2009. Also, please make sure the mitigation measures are clearly identified.
- 5. Considering vegetation impacts of Option A and the related discussion, IV.a. should be checked as "less than significant with mitigation incorporated."

#### General

6. Statements regarding environmental impacts note impacts are "less than significant" or "would not degrade the quality of the environment" (see pages 21, 47 and 48 for examples). These statements should also note impacts are less than significant because mitigation measures have been incorporated.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Force Main Replacement Project Initial Study (May 2014) located in Carlsbad, CA. California State Parks (CSP) is a Trustee Agency and is mandated by law to protect the natural, cultural and recreational resources found within the State Park system. We submit the following comments to assist you in developing project alternatives which avoid impacts to CSP Property and park visitors. The Proposed Alternative "C" Alignment is within the City of Carlsbad's (City's) Right-of-Way but in close proximity to the South Carlsbad Beach Campground (Campground). CSP is concerned with two issues should the project be developed as proposed in Alternative "C": Interruption of access or services to campground users during construction and potential impacts to Cultural resources.

CSP provides beach access to Carlsbad State Beach for both day use visitors and overnight campers. This ingress and egress must be maintained during construction without interruption. Additionally, any construction related activities shall not interrupt CSP utility service (water, sewer, communications, and electricity) to the campground or day use facilities during construction.

CSP understands that all of the proposed work will occur within the City's Right-of-Way but it's possible that there may be impacts to a site that may extend to CSP land. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) has reviewed the abovereferenced Draft Mitigated Negative Declaration (DMND) for the B2 Force Main Replacement Project (Project) for the Leucadia Wastewater District (District) in the City of Carlsbad (City). The following statements and comments have been prepared pursuant to the Department's authority as Trustee Agency with jurisdiction over natural resources affected by the project (California Environmental Quality Act, [CEQA] Guidelines § 15386) and pursuant to our authority as a Responsible Agency under CEQA Guidelines section 15381 over those aspects of the proposed project that come under the purview of the California Endangered Species Act (Fish and Game Code § 2050 *et seq.*) and Fish and Game Code section 1600 *et seq.* The Department also administers the Natural Community Conservation Planning (NCCP) program. The City is participating in the Department's NCCP by implementing its approved Multiple Habitat Conservation Program (MHCP) Subarea Plan (SAP) and Habitat Management Plan (HMP).

The project alignment extends in a generally north-south direction along the Carlsbad coast near Carlsbad State Beach, beginning just north of Batiquitos Lagoon and terminating near 6500 Ponto Drive. The DMND analyzes three options. Under the first option, B1, B2 and B3 force mains would be replaced at existing diameters and realigned along an approximately 800-foot section in front of the Carlsbad Hilton Hotel. Under the second option a section would be abandoned and the B2 force main would be realigned in a new trench along the eastern edge of the southbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard. Under the third option, a new force main would be installed in the former and now abandoned southbound lanes of Carlsbad Boulevard. Pipeline installation would be primarily accomplished using conventional open trench methods. In this method, pavement is removed, heavy equipment is used to open a trench and the trench is backfilled after placement of the new pipeline. Single pipeline trenches are expected to be four feet wide and joint pipeline trenches would be six feet wide. Both types would be 8 to 13 feet deep.

The Department offers the following comments and recommendations to assist the District in avoiding or minimizing potential project impacts on biological resources:

The Initial Study (IS) dated May 2014 states that mitigation for impacts under the first option (Option A) would be developed based on the HMP for the City. The Department recommends that all impacts for each option be analyzed and appropriately mitigated according to the HMP, including standards and measures not currently included in the DMND. Inclusion of a table enumerating habitat acreage impacts and mitigation formulae in compliance with Table 11 on page D-113 of the HMP would facilitate analysis of project impacts. The Department recommends that in the Final MND, in addition to coastal sage scrub (CSS), the potential for impacts to all habitat types indicated on DMND maps, such as coyote brush scrub, goldenbush scrub, and non-native and disturbed habitats, be evaluated in the context of the HMP. Any impacts to these additional habitat types should be mitigated in accordance with the HMP.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff and the Engineering Committee requests that the Board of Directors:

- Authorize the General Manager to execute Amendment 1 to the Agreement with Wave Crest Oceanfront, LLC, owners of Hilton Carlsbad Oceanfront Resort & Spa, to postpone the realignment of Batiquitos (B3) Force Main contingent upon prior approval to realign the B1 and B2 Force Mains west of Highway 101.
- 2. Discuss and take other action as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND:

This item was discussed by the EC at its July 2, 2014 meeting and the EC concurred with staff to recommend this item for Board approval.

In February 2014, the Board of Directors authorized an agreement with Wave Crest Oceanfront, LLC (Wave Crest), owners of Hilton Carlsbad Oceanfront Resort & Spa (Hilton) to contribute the sum of \$220,000 towards the realignment of Batiquitos Force Mains B1, B2, and B3 into north bound Carlsbad Boulevard (Highway 101) as part of the Batiquitos (B2) Force Main Replacement Project (Project).

The key provisions of this agreement were as follows:

- LWD would realign not only B2, but also B1 and B3 in the approximate 800 linear foot frontage area of the Hilton to the northbound lanes of Highway 101.
- Hilton would contribute the sum of \$220,000 to help offset the additional cost of the realignment in that area.
- LWD would ensure that the construction in the Hilton area would occur between October 1<sup>st</sup> and April 1<sup>st</sup> to coincide with the Hilton's offseason.

The contribution of \$220,000 of private funding represents a high level of commitment on the Hilton's part and also covers a significant portion of the additional cost to realign the force mains in the Hilton area as opposed to replacing only B2. This figure was derived based on the cost differential between the District replacing all the force mains in their existing alignment at the Hilton and realigning the pipelines into Highway 101.

The realignment of the three force mains resulted in the project being required to satisfy California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) standards. Meeting these standards required an

environmental impact assessment of the entire project alignment. During the assessment, Coastal Sage Scrub (California Gnatcatcher habitat) was discovered over the current B2 alignment in the vacant area (Ponto Area) northwest of the intersection of Ponto Drive and Avenida Encinas, establishing the area as environmentally sensitive. The assessment resulted in the completion of an Initial Study (IS) and development of a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND).

With the Ponto Area designated as environmentally sensitive, the design team considered relocating B2 into Highway 101 north of Avenida Encinas to prevent disturbance of the Ponto Area. As a result, the MND was developed to include three B2 alignment options, Options A, B and C. Prior to this item, the Board will have considered authorizing staff to proceed with Option C. Under this option B2 will be realigned into the west shoulder of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard from north of Avenida Encinas to Ponto Road and continue north in the abandoned section of south bound Carlsbad Boulevard to Breakwater Road. The remaining B2 sections will be replaced in the current alignment.

#### DISCUSSION:

Board approval of the Option C alignment will relocate B1 and B2 into the same alignment west, across Highway 101, from the Hilton. Staff contacted Wave Crest to inform them of the modified alignment. Wave Quest asked if the relocation of B3 in front of the Hilton is still required. The relocation of B3 was being done only as a result of the Wave Crest Funding Agreement. It is not out of operational necessity to the District. Therefore, Wave Crest stated that, if Option C is approved, they would prefer that B3 not be realigned at this time. Wave Crest will still provide the agreed to \$220,000 Project funding. To maintain the intent of the original agreement, staff agreed to amend the original agreement to state that when the B3 Force Main requires replacement, it would be relocated into the north bound lanes of Highway 101 away from the Hilton property. The amendment is attached for your review. Based on the continued positive public-private partnership between Wave Crest and the District, staff recommends that the Board of Directors execute this amendment with Wave Crest Oceanfront, LLC.

#### AMENDMENT TO FUNDING CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT

This Amendment modifies the Funding Contribution Agreement by and between the Leucadia Wastewater District, a County Water District ("District") and Wave Crest Oceanfront, LLC ("Wave Crest") dated <u>February 12, 2014</u> ("Agreement").

#### RECITALS

A. WHEREAS, the Agreement provides that Wave Crest will make a Funding Contribution in exchange for the District's agreement to relocate all three Force Mains (B1, B2 and B3) at the same time and to an alignment that is within the north bound lanes of Highway 101(identified in the Agreement as the "Realignment Option" and shown on the attached exhibits as Option A).

B. WHEREAS, the District has determined that there are feasible options to move at least two of the Force Mains even further away from the Hilton to the alignment locations identified on the attached exhibits as Options B and C.

C. WHEREAS, the District desires to relocate Force Mains B1 and B2 to the Option C alignment at this time, and to defer relocation of Force Main 3 to a later date.

D. WHEREAS, Wave Crest agrees that relocation of Force Mains B1 and B2 to the Option C alignment is appropriate and does not object to deferral of the Force Main B3 relocation, provided that its eventual relocation is consistent with the terms and conditions of this Amendment,

NOW, THEREFORE, Wave Crest and the District agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. At this time, the District plans to relocate Force Mains B1 and B2 to the Option C alignment. If for any reason, the District elects to not relocate Force Mains B1 and B2 to the Option C alignment, they shall be relocated to alignments that are consistent with Options A or B.

2. At this time, the District plans to defer relocation of Force Main B3, provided that when it is relocated: (i) the relocation adjacent to the Hilton shall be within an alignment consistent with Option A, B or C, and the District shall use its best efforts to ensure any work within the right-of-way adjacent to Hilton occurs between September 15<sup>th</sup> and April 1<sup>st</sup> unless an actual or imminent Force Main failure requires work to be done outside of the designated work period. Should the District elect not to relocate Force Mains B1 & B2 to the Option C alignment as described in Section 1 of this Amendment, the District agrees to relocate all three forcemains in the area of the Hilton in a manner consistent with the original February 12, 2014 Agreement.

3. The Funding Contribution shall be paid to the District within fourteen (14) business days of the public meeting at which the District Board of Directors does all of the following: (i) adopts the Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Force Main Relocation Project,

(ii) authorizes the General Manager to proceed forward with bids for the Project that includes Relocation of Force Mains B1 and B2 to the Option C alignment, and (iii) approves this Amendment.

4. The parties agree that payment of the Funding Contribution shall be full and adequate compensation that covers the private benefit of incorporating the realignment options approved by the Agreement, as amended herein, and that Wave Crest shall not be required to make any additional contributions to the Force Main Replacement Project.

5. The parties further agree that should Wave Crest make the Funding Contribution, and thereafter, the District relocate any of the Force Mains in a manner that is not in accordance with the Agreement, as amended herein, Wave Crest shall be entitled to a full refund of the Funding Contribution.

6. Except as provided herein, all terms and conditions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect.

7. Each individual signing this Amendment represents and warrants that he or she has been authorized to do so by the proper action of the party on whose behalf he or she has signed.

SUBJECT:	Integrated Travel Authorization and Expense Reimbursement Policy

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Staff and the Investment and Finance Committee (IFC) recommend that the Board of Directors:

1. Discuss and provide direction, as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND:

On February 8, 2006, the Board of Directors adopted Resolution No. 2158 establishing an Integrated Travel Authorization and Expense Reimbursement Policy. The policy updated reimbursement guidance as required by AB 1234 and integrated this guidance into a single policy for Directors and staff. On October 11, 2006 and November 14, 2007, the policy was amended to include the requirement for detailed receipts and to add the Special District Institute as an organization for which reimbursement of reasonable expenses were authorized. It was last updated on January 22, 2008 to authorize attendance at Batiquitos Lagoon Foundation (BLF) seminars, meetings, or conferences.

At the May 16, 2014 Board of Directors' meeting, the Board requested that staff bring this policy to the IFC and Board for review. The IFC reviewed the policy at their June 16, 2014 meeting and recommended minor changes to the policy that are indicated in the attached red-line strikeout form. In addition, the IFC also recommended that several areas be discussed by the full Board of Directors.

#### DISCUSSION:

The following areas were recommended for Board discussion:

1. Policy Section 2 (h):

Reimbursements paid by LWD shall be reported monthly to the LWD Board of Directors. This report shall state the payee, the amount and provide a description of the expense(s).

LWD currently reports all reimbursements (to Board members and employees) on a monthly basis in the "Demands" section of the Board agenda. This reporting is consistent with the current policy. In addition, staff also prepares a more detailed "Disclosure of Reimbursements Report" which is provided to the Board every six months. This report exceeds the requirement of Government Code Section 53065 which requires, at a minimum, an annual report.

This item is proposed for discussion to determine if a more detailed <u>monthly</u> report is required by the Board.

#### 2. Policy Section 3 (a) and (b):

LWD's Integrated Travel Authorization and Expense Reimbursement Policy contains a list of approved organizations and associations for which reimbursement at seminars, meetings or conferences is authorized. The policy requires that other seminars, meetings, or conferences not specifically authorized by the policy must be approved by the Board of Directors prior to attendance.

The IFC recommends that the current list of approved seminars, meetings and conferences be revised to remove the Special District Institute as shown in the attachment. This organization is no longer active and should be removed. The IFC also considered adding other organizations such as California Women Lead where attendance is on a sporadic basis. After discussion, however, the IFC determined that the current list adequately covers those organizations regularly attended by LWD Board or employees. In addition, the policy also allows for attendance at other meetings with appropriate Board approval as required.

This item is proposed for discussion to determine if additional revisions to the list of seminars, meetings or conferences are warranted.

#### 3. Policy Section 5 (b):

Overnight accommodations for multi-day conferences within a 50-mile radius of the Leucadia Wastewater District may be reimbursable, on a case-by-case basis, considering attendee specific factors, scheduling factors, and other factors reasonably related to the authorized activity that are not within the attendee's control.

Current policy allows reimbursement of expenses for attendance at conferences within a 50 mile radius of LWD on a case-by-case basis with approval by the General Manager. In addition, the Board receives a stipend for the initial day of travel to these conferences.

This item is proposed for discussion to determine if reimbursement of expenses should be authorized "with-out exception" or on a "case-by-case" basis. In addition, the IFC also requests that the Board consider if stipends for the initial travel-day is warranted and if the General Manager is the appropriate approval authority for "case-by-case" reimbursements submitted by the Board.

#### 4. Policy Section 7 (a) and (b):

Section 7 of the Travel and Reimbursement Policy authorizes reimbursement of miscellaneous expenses. The IFC recommends that the this list be revised as shown in the attachment to allow for reimbursement of internet access for LWD business and to encourage cell phone use for business and personal calls home while on authorized overnight stays.

### CONCLUSION:

Staff and the IFC requests that the Board discuss the items noted above and provide direction, as desired. Staff will make changes to the policy as directed and bring it back to the Board in August for final approval.

#### INTEGRATED TRAVEL AUTHORIZATION AND EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT POLICY

#### Ref: 07-083414-4123

#### 1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to establish requirements and implement rules and regulations governing travel authorization and expense reimbursement for LWD Directors and staff.

#### 2. Overview

- a. Directors and employees are encouraged to participate in those outside activities and organizations that in the judgment of the Board of Directors further LWD's interests.
- b. Expenses incurred by Directors and employees in connection with such activities are reimbursable provided that they are permitted by this Policy or otherwise authorized by the Board of Directors or General Manager where appropriate.
- c. All expenses incurred while participating in activities and organizations on LWD's behalf must be moderate, reasonable and necessary. Directors and employees are encouraged to exercise prudence in all expenditures. This policy is intended to result in no personal gain or loss to a Director or employee.
- d. Reimbursement shall be made only for legitimate expenses supported by vendor provided documentation or as may be allowable under applicable Internal Revenue Service (IRS) guidelines.
- e. Legitimate expenses shall include: transportation to and from activity destinations; ground transportation to and from airports, train, bus or trolley stations, activity locations, and lodging; overnight accommodations; meals; car rental, and certain related miscellaneous expenses described in this Policy.
- f. The most economical mode and class of transportation reasonably consistent with scheduling and cargo requirements shall be used.
- g. All reimbursements shall be made pursuant to a signed Travel Expense Report conforming to applicable requirements stated in this Policy.
- Reimbursements paid by LWD shall be reported monthly to the LWD Board of Directors. This report shall state the payee, the amount and provide a description of the expense(s).

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#### 3. Authorization

- a. LWD shall pay reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred for attendance at such meetings, conferences and seminars budgeted by the Board, concerning official district business, from which the District derives a benefit through the attendance of a representative. Reimbursement is authorized for attendance at meetings, conferences, and seminars held by the following organizations or associations:
  - California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA)
  - California Special Districts Association (CSDA)
  - California Sanitation Risk Management Authority (CSRMA)
  - California Water Environment Association (CWEA)
  - California WateReuse Association
  - Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce
  - Encinitas Chamber of Commerce
  - Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO)
  - Southern California Alliance of Publicly Owned Treatment Works (SCAP)
  - Special District Institute
  - Batiquitos Lagoon Foundation

Also authorized for reimbursement are expenses associated with attendance at a conference or organized educational activity conducted in compliance with subdivision (c) of Government Code Section 54952.2, including, but not limited to, ethics training required by Government Code Sections 53234-53235.5.

Attendance at other meetings, conferences and seminars not specifically authorized by this Policy must be approved by the Board of Directors prior to attendance for reimbursement of expenses.

- b. The General Manager or his/her designee shall authorize all employee travel prior to departure. LWD shall pay reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred by the General Manager and/or staff at meetings, conferences and seminars for the following organizations or associations:
  - California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA)
  - California Special Districts Association (CSDA)
  - California Sanitation Risk Management Authority (CSRMA)
  - California Water environment Association (CWEA)
  - Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO)
  - California WateReuse Association
  - Southern California Alliance of Publicly Owned Treatment Works (SCAP)
  - Special District Institute
  - Batiguitos Lagoon Foundation

Policy Adopted: February 8, 2006 Policy Amended: October 11, 2006 November 14, 2007 January 22, 2008 Other meetings, conferences and seminars not specifically authorized by this Policy must be approved by the General Manager prior to attendance for reimbursement of expenses.

c. No travel shall be authorized unless sufficient appropriated funds are available.

#### 4. Reimbursement of Authorized Transportation Expenses

- a. Attendees traveling by airplane shall fly using the lowest cost mode and class reasonably consistent with scheduling requirements. Attendees shall take the most direct and time-efficient route reasonably available. In the event a more expensive mode or class of air transportation is used, or a less direct route is taken, the reimbursable amount shall be limited to the cost of the lowest cost commercial airfare available via the most direct route.
- b. Attendees driving their personal vehicle to an activity shall be limited to the IRS specified rate in an amount not exceeding the lowest cost airfare plus normal ground transportation costs for the trip taken by personal vehicle. Where an LWD vehicle is used gasoline and other necessary maintenance or repair expenses shall be reimbursable.
- c. Where practical and reasonable, attendees may elect to travel by train via the most economical mode and class reasonably consistent with scheduling requirements and shall be reimbursable at the lesser of: the actual amount paid, the lowest cost airfare plus normal ground transportation costs, or, LWD's costs to reimburse for the use of a personal vehicle.
- d. Only the most economic form of ground transportation reasonably consistent with scheduling requirements shall be reimbursable. Public transportation including buses, light rail, commuter trains and commercial vehicles including shuttles and taxicabs should be used in lieu of car rental.
- e. Rental car expenses for the lowest priced class of vehicle appropriately suited for the use intended and traveling conditions shall be reimbursable where other modes of transportation are not reasonable or practical considering destination and scheduling requirements. Rental cars should, whenever possible, be reserved in advance to ensure the choice of vehicle class most appropriately suited is available. The purchase of rental car insurance above that required by the agency is not reimbursable.
- f. Airport and train station parking shall be reimbursable at long-term rates for travel exceeding twenty-four (24) hours. Destination parking for personal, LWD and rental vehicles shall be reimbursable at self-parking rates where available.
- g. The use of promotional or discounted fares, corporate or government rates and, in the case of multiple attendees, ride and rental car sharing, shall be utilized when available. The cost for tolls, ferries, short-term parking, and other expenses reasonably related to the authorized activity shall be reimbursable.

#### 5. Reimbursement of Authorized Overnight Accommodations

a. Expenses for overnight accommodations incurred within the LWD Service Area shall not be reimbursable.

- b. Overnight accommodations for multi-day conferences within a 50-mile radius of the Leucadia Wastewater District may be reimbursable, on a case-by-case basis, considering attendee specific factors, scheduling factors, and other factors reasonably related to the authorized activity that are not within the attendee's control.
- c. LWD shall reimburse for prearranged overnight accommodations at single room rates using discounted conference, government, or corporate rates at locations reasonably proximate to the activity for which the overnight accommodations were authorized. Lodging costs shall not exceed the maximum group rate published by the conference or activity sponsor, provided that lodging at the group rate is available to the Director/employee at the time of booking. If the group rate is not available, the Director/employee shall use comparable lodging that is consistent with the activity's government or group rates. Where attendees share a room, reimbursement shall be made at the double occupancy rate.
- d. Overnight accommodations shall be reimbursed when the authorized activity starts too early to permit a reasonable travel itinerary on that day or when the authorized activity concludes too late to permit a reasonable travel itinerary that evening.

#### 6. Reimbursement of Authorized Meals

- a. Expenses for meals, including non-alcoholic beverages and tips ordinarily associated with normal eating customs, shall be reimbursable. The reimbursable amount shall be limited to the typical cost of meals in the region during the course of travel and while attending the authorized activity. The IRS publishes locally calculated meal and incidental expense guidelines that shall provide a basis for analyzing the reasonableness of meal expense reimbursement requests.
- b. The maximum daily amount reimbursable for meals, including beverages and tips, is \$75.00.
- c. Exceptions to these limitations shall be made in situations where participation in the authorized activity makes it necessary to eat at a specific place or to attend special meal functions.
- d. Expenses incurred by paying for another guest's meal shall be reimbursable provided that the guest's presence at the meal is reasonably related to the authorized activity.

#### 7. Reimbursement of Authorized Miscellaneous Expenses

- a. The following miscellaneous items are also reimbursable:
  - telephone calls to conduct LWD business;
  - reasonable costs for internet access to conduct LWD business one telephone call home for each overnight stay on authorized travel;
  - reasonable transportation costs to local restaurants or other destinations related to participation in the authorized activity;

- customary and usual tips for baggage handling, transportation and other travel, lodging and meals related services; and,
- other unavoidable, necessary and reasonable expenses related to the authorized travel.
- b. The use of cellular telephones, if available, is encouraged when conducting LWD business or calling home-in accordance with Section 7 (a) above. If a cellular telephone is not available, LWD will reimburse telephone calls to conduct LWD business and one telephone call home for each overnight stay while on authorized travel.
- c. LWD shall not pay or reimburse expenses for entertainment, movies, recreational activities, laundry services, parking or traffic violation fines, tours, side trips or any other similar activities.
- d. All Director expenses that do not fall within this travel reimbursement policy shall be approved by the Board of Directors, in a public meeting before the expense is incurred.
- e. All employee expenses that do not fall within this travel reimbursement policy shall be approved by the General Manager before the expense is incurred.

#### 8. Travel Advance

a. A travel advance in a sum equal to the estimated expenditures chargeable to the District for the trip may be made if requested by the Director or employee. The amount of the advance shall be approved by the General Manager.

#### 9. Expense Reimbursement Claim Form

- a. Within twenty-one (21) working days of return, all persons requesting reimbursement for LWD authorized business travel expenses shall fill out and deliver to the General Manager a Travel Expense Report Form (this "Form" is Attachment 1 to this Policy).
- b. All items for which reimbursement is requested must be supported by receipts except for tips and published rates paid to public transportation systems that do not provide receipts or where the receipt document may be used in lieu of cash to acquire other public transportation services. Receipts, provided for reimbursement, shall show an itemized summary of services provided or items purchased.
- c. Transportation expenses shall be supported by documentation provided by the carrier including flight or route numbers, dates and cost.
- d. Lodging expenses shall be supported by detailed documentation provided by the vendor.
- e. Meals expenses shall be supported by documentation provided by the restaurant or activity host, or, a credit card billing stating the date, location and amount of the meal.

- f. Where an attendee pays or shares any expenses of another person (including other LWD Directors and employees) the receipt submitted shall note the name of the individual and his or her public agency or affiliation to the authorized activity.
- g. In no event shall expenses incurred by a guest be reimbursed by LWD.
- h. Advances, or other credits such as a prepayment by LWD, must be included as a deduction on the Form.
- i. In the event a travel advance exceeds the amount chargeable to the District, the Director or employee shall refund the District the difference between the travel advance and the expenditures chargeable to the District.
- j. Incomplete forms, including forms not supported by documentation as required by this Policy shall be returned to the attendee unprocessed along with written communication specifying the documentation required.
